

MONDAY 2 P. M. SESSION.

The Department Commander read his Annual Address as follows:

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

COMRADES: We have assembled today for the seventh time as a Department Encampment, and for the second time, within the confines of your beautiful city, to deliberate upon the affairs of our fraternity.

My heart thrills with emotion at the privilege of meeting you all here today, and to all who have gladdened this gathering by their presence. I want to extend a cordial fraternal greeting.

As comrades, our first duty is to reverently thank our Heavenly Father and to attune our hearts to the sentiments uttered by our

Chanlain.

For the past year we have witnessed the calamities caused by man's distrust; industries, have been paralyzed; business has been at a stand still, and financial distress has prevailed throughout our broad land. Yet through all these misfortunes, my comrades, God has not been forgetful of his children, and when I look upon this beautiful city, and your broad fields, and knowing the bountiful harvests of which you are assured, and the bright prospects, of the future. I envy you, my comrades of Maricopa county, your happy lot. Next to the honor of being a member of the Grand Army of the Republic, I like to boast of being one of the pioneers of the City of Pheenix.

If there is any man or lot of men, that should be canonized, it ought to be him, and his associates, who founded the Grand Army of the Republic, for its principles and teachings are typical of all that is commendable in a patriotic, loyal citizen and a worthy upright man. Our order teaches us obedience to the laws of our country, an observance of our obligations to our comrade and their families, and we should ever bear these teachings of our loyal order in mind.

I would call the attention of the members here assembled, to the reports, and recommendations of the official staff of the Department. They have, each one, covered the ground allotted them in a creditable manner, and left but little for me to suggest, if any

thing.

I find from the Department Inspector's report that the department has a membership of 266 in good standing. Add to this the members that has become members since the Inspector's report was submitted, and which is furnished me by the Assistant Adjutant General, we have a total membership of 289 in good standing.

At the end of the last fiscal year we had 75 suspended mem-

bers on our roll; this year we have 43.

One Post surrendered its charter, and one new Post has been organized, and I am sorry to say that one Post is sleeping, if not dead. I refer to the Post at Tempe, but knowing that that town is growing in population, and believing that sooner or later they will wake up, I have not felt like demanding their charter from them.

Our finances are about in the same condition they were at the last Encampment, and it requires strict economy to maintain the

Department, and keep the present surplus on hand.

None of the Posts in the Department have a relief fund, therefore the amounts reported by the different posts throughout the department cuts a sorry figure in the charity account, as most of the money expended for charitable purposes is raised by private subscriptions among the comrades, and not reported. I can see a man in this audience now, that has given more out of that right hand pocket of his, than is reported to our inspector by the whole department.

Of the Woman's Relief Corps I am sorry to say that from personal observation I have not had any opportunity to familiarize myself with their workings in the territory, but what I read and hear of the good work they are doing throughout this grand nation for the old soldiers, their widows and orphans, I know that from every old veteran heart, there must come up a "God bless

them."

It should be the duty of every member of the Grand Army to take an interest in, and encourage, the Sons of Veterans in their

organization.

Memorial Day each year becomes more and more interesting, and more generally observed. In the southern part of the territory, we have very few flowers left when Memorial Day comes, and but for the ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps (and ladies of the G. A. R.) of California, many graves would go undecorated, but they have never failed in sending us a supply, and I have often wished we could thank them personally.

Death has been among us during the past year. From the Medical Director's report I find that there has been a loss of twelve

members, and I know of double that number of deaths among the

old soldiers that were not members of our order.

Let met read you a few lines from the address of our National Commander at the National Encampment last September. He said: "A few years ago it was said that a regiment of Comrades had moved to the other side of the river. Some years later, a brigade, and at a later gathering a full division was said to have passed away; and now Comrades," said the commander, "it is left for me to report to you, that since we held our last Encampment an entire Army Corps, with its full complement of generals, has received its final marching orders from the Great Commander."

I wish to express my grateful sense of appreciation to all the officers and comrades of this department for their uniform courtesy to me, and prompt compliance with all requests; and I take this opportunity to acknowledge numberless obligations to Comrade A. B. Sampson, A. A. A. G., for valuable support and assistance. His knowledge and fraternal experience were of valuable assistance to

me.

My labors are about concluded. A few short hours and Ishall lay down the gavel of this office to be taken up by the hand of another. I ask that you extend to my successor the same fraternal consideration that you have shown to me. For the honor of the highest gift in your power, conferred upon me, words are too feeble to express my deep sense of gratitude.

And now, comrades, let me say to you, we, also, are marching on; the sun will soon set, the light will glimmer for a little while in the gloaming, taps will sound, and all is still. "All quiet along the Potomac tonight, not a sound save the rush of the river. The dew falls unseen on the face of the dead. The picket is off duty forever," but thank God there will be a joyous reveille in the morn.

Stebbins Post No. 8 surrendered its Charter, and transfers have been issued by the Department to thirteen members in good standing.

I have been unable to get any reply to my communications from members of Logan Post No. 7.

A charter was issued February 23rd, 1894, to Sedgwick Post No. 10, located at Williams.

I call your attention to the fact that Arizona has no law against wearing the button or badge of the Grand Army of the Republic, unless the person is a member in good standing in the Order, and I suggest that a committee be appointed, to secure the passage of "an act" by the next Legislature, similar to the act in force in the State of Indiana.

The following report was adopted by the last Encampment, "In the matter of the recommendations of the Assistant Adjutant General in regard to providing a suitable place for keeping the books and records of the Grand Army of the Republic, and also for the payment of a small salary to the Assistant Adjutant General, and the Assistant Quartermaster General, we recommend that this entire matter be referred to the Council of Administration, with power to make such allowance in each of these cases as the condition of the funds in the hands of the Department Officers may seem to justify."

I was appointed Assistant Quartermaster General and Acting Assistant Adjutant General July 1st, 1893. I found both offices in the same condition as reported by the Assistant Adjutant General at the last Encampment, who said that "There was very little worth preserving at present in his hands."

I wish to acknowledge that you authorized me to buy what was necessary. I thought it best to let the next administration "start in" with a new set of books, such as are required by the rules and regulations. A seal should be provided for the A. A. General and also for the A. Q. M. General.

Headquarters that are moved yearly, cannot be kept orderly. It is difficult to find any records except for the past year or two.

The proceedings of six annual Department Encampments have been published, and we have on hand only copies of 1892 and 1893.

The National Encampment Proceedings we have only 1890-1-2-3.

Proceedings of other Departments we have only two copies of 1893, when the full number is about 250.

I suggest that the Quartermaster be selected from the same city each year, or some comrade appointed to take charge of old post records, important papers, books, etc., not often needed. A case should be provided for the same, so that papers and records can be found without trouble, only the necessary books and papers to be sent to each Encampment. I do not wish any compensation for my services for the past eight months as Act. A. A. G. and A. Q. M. G. If the funds of our Department would justify it, I would be in favor of allowing the A. A. G. a small salary. I think that \$100 per year would be the full value for the services of the A. A. G. and \$25 per year the full value for the services of the A. Q. M. G. When we have 1000 members in this Department we can afford to pay salaries.

The following suggestion was adopted at the 3rd Annual Encampment held at Tombstone on the 3rd and 4th of March, 1890, "That each post appoint a historian to secure the military record of each member, a copy of the record to be forwarded to Department Headquarters." This was promulgated in G. O. No. 2, April 12, 1890, by Department Commander Geo. F. Coats. There are no records in this office showing the service of the members in this Department, their military history should be preserved at Department Headquarters for future reference.

I do not think that it is advisable for this Department to keep on hand supplies not furnished by the National Headquarters.

To yourself and my associates, and the comrades throughout the Department with whom I have had official relations, my thanks are due for the uniform courtesy with which I have been treated.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR.

For the year ending December 31, 1893. Flagstaff, Arizona, Feb. 2, 1894.

A. B. Sampson, A. A. A. G.

COMRADE: I have the honor to submit the following annual report as Inspector of this Department for the Encampment and

for publication, etc.:

Negley Post No. 1, Tucson-Has 60 members; ritual work partially committed to memory; officers, guards and members properly uniformed; has four muskets; not all officers are regular in attendance; about 50 per cent of resident members attend and they exhibit an interest in the post; the records are well and properly kept; all orders regularly read and observed; all reports and taxes forwarded; muster-in charges \$2; per capita tax, \$42; only necessary benefits paid; no relief fund; expended in charity. \$5; future prospects excellent. The Assistant Inspector of the Post says:

Post has 75 members, of this number 30 reside in Tucson, and six of that number have business from the city. Seven comrades have died here during the past year, 5 of them buried in the city, only one of them was a member of this Post. Expended by individual members for charity, I estimate at \$100. I find it is impossible to get a roster of veterans of various wars. This Post will issue a new roster in January, 1894. Only 17 members of this post draw a pension, several deserving pensioners have been dropped. The Post has a cemetery enclosed and properly laid out. Three members are in Soldier's Homes.

Burnside Post No. 2, Tombstone—Has 22 members; ritual work committed to memory; officers and guards partially uniformed, but the members are not; has four muskets; all officers are regular in attendance; members do not attend and they exhibit small interest in the post; the records are well and properly kept; all orders regularly read and observed; all reports and taxes forwarded; musterin charges \$2; per capita tax, \$13.20; only necessary benefits paid; no relief fund; expended in charity, \$57.65; future prospects poor. The Assistant Inspector of the Post says:

Twenty-two members in good standing; five members of the Post drawing pensions; seventeen members of the Post not drawing any pensions; 42 soldiers of the Rebellion within the jurisdiction of Burnside Post; five soldiers of the war drawing pensions; eleven soldiers war of the Rebellion have been dropped, one was also a Mexican war veteran; a plot in the cemetery valued at \$150. We have a set of flags ordered, but no value placed on them.

Barrett Post No. 3, Prescott-Has 59 members; ritual work partially committed to memory; some of the officers, guards and

members are properly uniformed; has two muskets; officers are generally in attendance; few of the members attend and exhibit an interest in the post; the records are well and properly kept; all orders regularly read and observed; all reports and taxes forwarded; muster in charges, \$2; per capita tax, \$35.40; only necessary benefits paid; no relief fund; expended in charity, \$12.75; future prospects are fair for next year. The Assistant Inspector of the Post says:

A large majority of the members are engaged in mining and ranching, consequently are widely scattered over the country; those residing in the city and vicinity near by, attend the meetings of the Post quite regularly; those engaged in mining etc., manage to attend once or twice a year; a few never attend or pay dues; the post has been very lenient, but during the next six months quite a number will be suspended; quite a number who joined years ago and were suspended for non payment of dues, have signified their desire to rejoin this coming year.

Ransom Post No. 4, Flagstaff—Has 27 members; ritual work partially committed to memory; officers, guards and members partially uniformed; has one musket; all officers are regular in attendance; members are good in attendance and they exhibit an interest in the post; the records are well and properly kept; all orders regularly read and observed; all reports and taxes forwarded; muster-in charges, \$2.50; per capita tax, \$16.20; only necessary benefits paid; no relief fund; expended in charity, \$5.80; future prospects

good. The Assistant Inspector of the Post says:

This Post ownes its hall and one and one half (1½) lots fronting on R. R. avenue and Beaver street, also a four acre plat in the Flagstaff Fraternity cemetery, one mile south of town valued at \$50. Market value of real estate, hall and lots, \$619.95 (this is 3/4) of its value last year) cash invested in flags, furniture, etc., \$235. Total real estate valued at \$894.95. Members of our post drawing pensions 9; members whose pension claims are pending 9; members whose pension claims have been rejected 3; members who have never applied for pension 6; total membership in good standing on Dec. 31st, 1893, 27. Number of soldiers war of the Rebellion living within this post jurisdiction not members of our Post are as follows: Those drawing pensions 21; those having pension claims pending, 18; those who have never applied for pension, 14; those who have had their pension claims rejected, 7, making a total of 60 add to this our membership 27 it makes a total of 87. We have two Mexican war veterans, one drawing a pension, the other one's pension claim pending. One widow of the war 1812 here drawing a pension, real old lady, though quite strong yet.

Phoenix—Has 56 members; ritual work committed to memory; officers, guards and members partially uniformed; has no muskets; all officers are regular in attendance; all members attend and they exhibit an interest in the post; the records are well and properly kept; all orders regularly read and observed; all reports and taxes forwarded; muster-in charges, \$3; per capita tax, \$33.60; only necessary benefits paid; no relief fund; expended in charity, none; future prospects very good. Assistant

Inspector Post No. 5, makes no remarks.

Alexander Post No. 6, Globe—Has 27 members; ritual work partially committed to memory; not all officers, guards and members are properly uniformed; has three muskets; officers are not

regular in attendance; members do not attend and a few exhibit an interest in the post; the records are well and properly kept; all orders regularly read and observed; all reports and taxes forwarded; muster in charges \$5; per capita tax, \$16.20. only necessary benefits paid; no relief fund; expended in charity, \$25; future prospects

fair. The Assistant Inspector of the Post says:

I can only add that the prospects of this Post is fair for the next year. There are only a few members who reside in the town and are regular in their attendance, the others are scattered through the country and can't always be here at the regular meetings of the post, so that the work keeping up the post devolves upon a very limited number, still we are not in debt very much. We hope the coming year will be better than the one just ending.

Fremont Post No. 9, Yuma-Has 5 members; no ritual work committed to memory; officers, guards and members are not properly uniformed; has no muskets; officers are not regular in attendance; no members attend and they partially exhibit an interest in the post; the records are not well and properly kept; all orders regularly read and observed; all reports and taxes forwarded; musterin charges, \$2.50; per capita tax, \$3; only necessary benefits paid; no relief fund; expended in charity. \$20; future prospects improving. The Assistant Inspector of the Post says:

As you can see from report our post is not doing much. Our members are few and scattered, we have no regular place to meet, what members there are living in town have become very careless, but we hope to get in some new material which will, I hope, give

new life to the Post.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN'S REPORT. HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF ARIZONA, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUPLIC, OFFICE OF THE CHAPLAIN. PHŒNIX, Arizona, March 2nd, 1894. I have the honor to submit my report as Department Chaplain for 1893-94.

During the year, just closing the posts of our department have maintained their high standing for loyalty and patriotic devotion to the flag, and notable regard for good morals and God's watchful care over our order and our nation. Nearly every post in the department not only observed Memorial Day, but in a body repaired to some church Sunday night preceding Memorial Day where a elergyman delivered an appropriate discourse. The reports of these services show not only a large attendance by the old soldiers and citizens, but patriotic sermons and enthusiastic attention. This is as it should be, and reveals a spirit of loyalty to those divine principles that are interwoven into the very texture of our national life. and recognition of the same divine, providence that was over us in our struggle to preserve the nations unity, inspiring and sustaining that unflinching devotion to country, and unselfish sacrifice of everything held dear until the final victory was secured. No men in the history of the world ever marched more clearly in the direct line of God's Providence, or were more thoroughly directed and protected thereby, than the soldiers who fought to maintain the union of our states during the war of the Rebellion. They were inspired, led and blessed by God. Our reunited and prosperous nation today, is the best of evidence in proof of this assertion. It is therefore not only peculiarly appropriate to make the worship of God a part of our memorial services, but most gratifying to note the unanimity of our grand order in delighting in these appropriate religious services.

All of the services on Memorial Day were enthusiastically observed by soldiers and citizens. The best talent of our Territory, from the Governor to the humblest citizens, vied with each other in exalting the touching memories of the day. As our heads whiten with age, and our bodies give way to inexorable time, our hearts grow warmer, our comradeship more sacred and our love of country more intense. Only the passing over the river to the better land, where loyalty to country will be swallowed up in loyalty to our nation's God, will ever check our enthusiastic devotion to the land we helped to save.

During the year, death has been at work in our ranks. Taps have sounded over the graves of 12 of our comrades.

The following, mustered out by death, have passed over the last river to cross, to join the great throng of heroes gone before.

Their going reminds as that our summons to our last battle may soon reach us and like good soldiers we should be ready to march at a moment's notice and be able to report to our-Great Captain, our duty faithfully done.

The committee on resolutions presented their report and the following resolutions were adopted:

No. 1. Resolved that the rules and regulations and ritual of the G. A. R. be so amended as to admit sons of veterans to membership in our order, and that this resolution be referred to the Council of Administration for a special report.

No. 2. Resolved, That we most heartily favor the organization of camps of S. of V. in this department and we urge the various post of the department to put forth efforts to organize as many

camps of the S. of V. as possible during the coming year.

No. 3. Resolved, that we demand prompt action by the government on all lawfully presented claims now on file in the Pension Bureau, to the end that justice to the soldiers may be done and the promises of the nation to the men who preserved it from overthrow may be redeemed.

No. 4. Resolved, That we regard a pension, once duly granted, is a vested right, not to be taken away or interfered with except on proof that it was procured by fraud and that the name of no pensioner should be stricken from the roll, without due notice having first been served upon him, and a full and fair opportunity afforded him to meet any charges affecting his right.

No. 5. Resolved, That we favor extending pensions to all union

soldiers of the Rebellion over sixty years of age.

No. 6. Resolved, That we favor Louisville, Ky., as the place for

holding the National Annual Encampment for 1895.

No. 7. Resolved, That we heartily endorse the earnest able and patrotic address of the Commander of this Department and when printed with the proceedings of this encampment we recommend that it be carefully read by all members of the order.

No. 8. Resolved, That the W. R. C. deserves our sincere thanks for the noble work done, and we bid them God speed in their work and assure them we will do all we can to aid them and

make more successful their work.

Upon motion, the A. Q. M. G. was instructed to provide for each Past Department Commander; a badge, to be known as Past Department Commander's badge, with an extra bronze bar across the ribbon under the eagle, bearing the name "Arizona" in the center and also the date of the service of the Past Department Commander.

The regular order of business having been completed, Past Department Commander A. L. Grow proceeded to install the officers elect for the coming year.

Upon assuming the presiding officer's chair, Department Commander Chas. D. Belden delivered an eloquent extemporaneous address, of which the following is a brief synopsis:

COMRADES:—I thank you sincerely for the honor you have bestowed upon me. I have already served this department as Adjutant General for two years, and am familiar with its requirements, and now having just solemnly sworn to discharge the duties of the principal office, I assure you that I will use my utmost strength and best endeavor to render efficient service and promote the wel-

fare of the Grand Army of the Republic in Arizona.

I am proud that I am a member of the Grand Army. I thank God for permitting me to render the service necessary to enable me to be a comrade. When the war of the rebellion broke out I was consumed with a desire to enlist. I was too young for acceptance except as a drummer boy, and my parents refused consent, but as soon as I could be enlisted, in 1863, I was received and immediately went into service. I cannot say that it was exactly a heroic sense of patriotism that impelled me, but I had a strong and earnest wish that the war would not cease before I had had an opportunity to take part therein. I had by my reading of history a profound respect for the warrior. I had found that history was almost a continuous relation of the surroundings of national contests, and that the list of heroes was almost wholly confined to the soldiery, and not only that, but to those who were successful in a good cause. I did not exactly hope to become a hero, but I wanted to do something for my country and my people and my home. I had walked by the evergreen hedges in the cemetery at New Haven, Connecticut, and had seen upon the headstone over the fresh

grave of that young officer who seemingly had a brilliant future before him, and who was killed at Big Bethel, one of the first engagements of the war, Lieutenant Winthrop, this quotation:

"Dulce et decorum est pro patria mori." (Sweet and pleasant it is to die for one's country). And over other graves I had seen "Pro patria et Gloria" (for country and glory), and I thought at such times that I could lie in that grave contented, should I have earned such an epitaph. So I went with my regiment happily. I endured all that I was called upon to pass through, exhilerated with the consciousness that I was doing the grandest service that man can render to mankind in things of this life. I have always been proud of that service. I aid not look upon myself as a hero. but as a single man of a band of heroes. I have since come to the conclusion, and now declare it, that the private soldier-every one of them-every one of the hundreds of thousands who went forward cheerfully and walked the steady way in which he was ordered, manfully offering himself on an equality with each of the others. was as deservedly entitled to be enrolled as a hero as is the one who, under peculiar circumstances and a sudden impulse, rushes forward to do some uncommon act. I cannot see more to honor in the one who, having an uncommon chance, executes a brilliant achievement and the ordinary soldier in the ranks who can stand quiet and steady in the midst of the most awful carnage. That I passed safely through the ordeals, as did many others, I have to thank a watchful Providence. I will not take a "veteran's" privilege just now and relate for your delectation (and my own astonishment) any of my marvelous doings. Every veteran is permitted to make great claims to deeds of valor, but great as many deeds may appear, I yet hold to the assertion just made, that the quiet obedience to orders when it means a constant exposure to frightful injury, and even to death, is as heroic and valorous as possible.

Our army disbanded, returned home and entered upon the quiet pursuits of life, much to the astonishment of the world, and it is another wonderful tribute to my comrades that for nearly thirty years they have not only retained the confidence and respect of the people, but have greatly added to the high esteem that was then lavishly bestowed upon them. It was only the other day that a prominent citizen, not a Grand Army man, said to me: "I feel when I meet a man who wears a G. A. R. button, that I am dealing with a man who has the very soul of honor, one who has had a peculiar discipline that has implanted in his life a strong sense of

As time goes by I feel more and more a kindly sense of love and esteem for a "comrade." So do others. I have many other pleasant associations, many more affiliations. I call many by the affectionate title of "brother," but I feel there is a more deep significance to the title "comrade." It includes the brother and signifies somewhat more. I will relate an incident which, to my mind, portrays the intensity of the sentiment. The scene was a court room. A prosecuting attorney was cross-questioning a witness. He was convinced that the man was but one of a bad gang of villains. The attorney was excitedly hurling contemptuous epithets at the whole gang, and turning upon the one in question, said: "You are a bad man. Your whole life must have been steeped in crime. You have undoubtedly been many times behind the bars of justice.

You certainly have been in prison, have you not?"

The witness replied in an unsteady voice, "I have." "Yes," says the attorney, "I knew it. I knew I should unearth your record. Now, tell me what prison it was."

"It was Andersonville," said the man.

"Good God," exclaimed the attorney, turning pale. "I was there, too!" and he extended his hand and rushed over to the man and said: "Comrade, forgive me," and he abandoned the case, and afterward found out that he had been prosecuting an innocent man. He knew in his heart that there was something in the experience of that frightful ordeal that purified a man and made

it impossible for him to be a criminal.

Well, comrades, we have good reason to be proud of our order and of each other. We have done our duty to our country and our fellow man. Shall we falter now; shall we rest content and let the future take care of itself? Not at all. It is our duty, as well as our highest privilege, to still work for the welfare and maintenance of our grand, good government. It is our duty to endeavor to promote all moral and political reforms that will strengthen our republic. We fought for the preservation of liberty. We contended against oppression in all its forms. There still remains many issues yet to be decided. Let us manfully continue our work and fight for the right, as God gives us to see the right. And may the God of our fathers, the Almighty God who created and has preserved us a nation, preserve us and keep us during the coming year, and may it be one of peace and prosperity to each of us, and to the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic.

A vote of thanks was tendered J. W. Owen post for the use of their hall and courtesies extended, and to the

ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps.

There being no further business to come before the Encampment, the Seventh Annual Encampment was declared duly adjourned.

I. As already announced in General Order No. 6, the Seventh Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic, will convene at the city of Phœnix. Arizona, on the 12th day of March, 1894, and will continue from day to day until the business of the Encampment is completed.

II. The rates for the transportation and accommodation of the members of the Grand Army of the Republic will be as favor-

IV. Attention is called to General Order No. 4, National Headquarters, with reference to the observance of Washington's Birthday. Grand Army Posts are requested to hold proper services on that day. 

The report of the committee was adopted and the committee discharged.

On motion all Old Soldiers and Sailors who fought for the Stars and Stripes in the late war, were invited to seats in the Eucampment.

Comrades John Y. T. Smith, W. F. R. Schindler

and J. Guthrie Savage were appointed a Committee on Resolutions.

Comrade D. M. Riordan, on behalf of Ransom Post No 4, then delivered the following address of welcome:

COMRADES:—There is a saying commonly in use in this part of the country intended to guide men in daily conduct, and like many maxims it has a good, sound reason at bottom, although, also like many maxims, it does not fit every case. It is one of these reversable affairs, and runs about this wav: "Saw wood and say nothing," or vice versa. Now, as my chief occupation is sawing wood, the natural conclusion is that I should say nothing. If I followed my own inclinations that is the course I would pursue. But as our Commander has assigned to me the duty of saying a few words of welcome to our visiting comrades, it behooves me as a soldier, to perform that duty. Many duties of a soldier are pleasant, even if they are duties; and I can truly say this duty is of an unusually pleasant character. I feel prouder in the doing of it than I did when at guard mount I would be selected to parade in shining buttons and well blacked "gunboats" in front of the regimental headquarters.

We were used in war times to loud welcomes by the thundering of guns with all the pomp and circumstance of parade as some visiting military or civil dignitary gave us the benefit of his presence for, a few hours or days. We need no special reminders to recall to us the reception we met when our brethern in gray did their best to welcome us with hospitable hands to bloody graves. On many a bitter, stormy night when our lines were so close that the picket line was the skirmish line and we dispensed with videttes, the gladness with which we welcomed the sound of the approaching "third relief" was as deep and sincere as it was unceremonious. Little needed to be said; very little was, and that little often in a whisper over a bayonet. When we returned with our torn and tattered flags, with depleted ranks but with the satisfaction of knowing we had a country that

was all our own, the welcome we then received obliter ated all sad memories of march and fight, of hardship and of prison-pen, and we settled back into the places we could find in peaceful life, few of us even then realizing what that war meant, what it had cost in blood and treasure, and above all, what it meant to future generations.

It is well that we, as a picket guard, so to speak, of its survivors, should meet together and with song and story, mingled with the necessary routine business of our organization, keep alive the memories of those eventful days.

I am not going to dwell on those days. There is no need to a group of old soldiers. But I have another reason: I have noticed that on every occasion at which old soldiers are gathered, we are steadily reminded that we cannot, in the very nature of things, last very long and that therefore we should be treated very tenderly and so to speak, pigeon-holed, with every demonstration of respect. Now, you won't get any of that sort of a thing mixed up in the welcome from me. If I have noticed correctly, the old soldier is very much alive. Of course there are many of them, too many of them, who are feeling the effects of hardship and wounds. To those our sympathy and our help should be freely and abundantly bestowed. But I do not believe the old soldier by his general venerableness or his feebleness is any more in evidence, than the old farmer, the old railroader or the old miner. In other words the old soldier is very much on deck, and "strictly in it." As a vital impelling force, as a factor in the aggressive development of our unparalleled country, as a statesmen, as a worker, at the plow or the desk, in the forest and in the mine, by sea or land, as an explorer, as a builder of mighty cities, a subduer of physical obstacles, as a citizen, as a man, the old soldier is very well and very conspicuously to the front in every walk of life, in every community in which he lives.

And it is perfectly natural that this should be so, I believe. The aggregate of strength of mind and body, of high purpose and resolute endeavor, of courage in the face of obstacles or danger, of steady, unfaltering pluck, developed by the conditions under which we fought our war, vastly more than made good the great expenditure and waste it involved. A young man taught to hold his head up and keep touch of elbow with his comrade, to respect and obey all rightful authority, to endure cold or heat or fatigue without refusal, to face the danger of death by disease as readily as by the bullet if the duty of his station requires it, and to do all this for a worthy purpose, has acquired by that process manly qualities which will tell, are sure to tell, for good, upon his career in civil life. And I do not doubt that a large portion of the physical and mental vigor and sturdy self-reliance, the willingness to face issues and to deal with them even unto death, which are so noticable in the old veteran, are due to the training given by the terrible but magnificent school of war. So that, to my mind, the idea presents itself that if I wanted to build a transcontinental railroad, or bridge the Grand Canon, or found a community, or do any other great piece of work, I would rather take five thousand of the boys that stacked their arms victorious in '65, than five times their number who never smelt powder or ate "sowbelly," or stole corn from a hungry Government mule.

So that in extending to you the welcome of Comrades on behalf of Ransom Post, I do it as to men of force, men of character, men who would today spring as readily to action as they did before. I won't say how long ago it was.

In the name of Ransom Post I welcome you to a spot which would have been beyond the boundaries of the United States had we failed or proved laggards in the old days. To a region fair with the promises of a glad future, to a portion of the Territory as necessary to your welfare and that of your children, as you are to ours.

To a land in which past ages have left their mute, imperishable records of a race that has disappeared, and yet almost the newest in civilized development, within our borders. To a land in which many wonders are to be seen by those who have many days to spare for the purpose, and some can be seen by those who have only one. To a land in which the archaeologist and ethnologist could forever find new threads of mystic lore, leading them into the dim, bygone times; while the geologist could find every known rock and the biologist every known life-zone of plant or animal-a land for those who have leisure, and for those who must be busy. But higher than all these material things, and deeper than the gratification we have in speaking of them, is our joy as with fresh, cordial, spontaneous greeting we welcome you and those you love, to the hearts and the homes of the Skylight City."

Department Commander Belden responded as follows:

"COMRADE RIORDAN:—It is with pleasure that we receive this cordial welcome with which you greet us. We have long dwelt in fancy upon the delights of this trip; our anticipations have been framed upon no moderate scale, and we are eager to enjoy these delights to which you invite us by your generous spirit and eloquent language. We shall gratefully accept the hospitality so modestly proffered, and view the grandeur of your natural surroundings with awe and admiration, but we must reserve the kindlier and more homely sentiment of comradeship to the sensations created by meeting with you in your own hall—under your own roof.

It is with more than a common feeling of pleasure that we visit with you. You represent to us the ideal of the family. Here you have been provident. You have purchased this corner lot and upon it you have spent time, labor and money in building you a home. You have shown the spirit which is in you not only in the erection of this hall but also by the manner of its decora-

tions. You have done as the ordinary family so frequently does in lining your walls with memeutoes of peculiar significance to yourselves only. You have made this place teem with the spirit of the old soldiers, and I assure you. Comrade Riordan, and Comrades of Ransom Post, that the mere meeting with you in your Grand Army home should. and will, thrill our souls with new aspirations and hopes for the future of our Order.

We thank you for your kindly welcome.

ADDRESS OF THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

The department Commander then read his Annual address as follows:

COMRADES:—I welcome you to the Eighth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, of Arizona. My closing words, upon installation as Department Commander at our last year's encampment, expressed a hope that we should be spared and blessed during the year. Our Father in Heaven has mercifully spared most of us and has permitted us to meet again to care for the wants of our Department, to enjoy the fraternity, prepare for the charity and promote the loyalty for which our Order was founded.

This encampment was originally ordered for the second week in May, but an intimation was received that we would be honored by the presence of Commander-in-Chief Lawler could we postpone the time so as to accom-The Council of Administration decided to modate him make the attempt, but after much correspondence it was found to be impossible for the trip of the Commander-in-Chief to be so arranged as to include our encampment and those of the Northwestern states. Then our Flagstaff Comrades, who have displayed unusual energy and personal anxiety to insure our delegations a warm welcome and hospitable entertainment, expressed a desire that the meeting be arranged for Tuesday, June 11th. The matter was finally disposed of by the issuance of the General Order, convening the Encampment at this time.

It has been my privilege, during the year, to visit with a great part of the Comrades of this Department and to inspect most of our Post, and I take this occasion to sincerely thank the Comrades for their open-hearted welcome, for their expressions of cordial sentiments, and for their generous hospitality. I have found that our Comrades are zealous in their work, and that no opportunity for the display of either of the cardinal principles of our organization is slighted, but, on the contrary, a spirit of earnestness and willingness to discover opportunities for charity is apparent. I have found few veterans soliciting aid but many receiving it. So long as such a spirit prevails within our circles our fraternity should thrive.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Memorial day has been regularly and dutifully celebrated in all of our towns and by all of our posts. The attempts to make it a holiday for ordinary secular enjoyments have not been successful and in all of our cities this year the public ceremonies connected with our celebration of the day have been the exclusive public exercises. It is well for our nation that the spirit of Memorial Day is properly regarded. Memorial day alone has done more to effect a reconciliation between the two great sections of our country that once were hostile than all else that has been undertaken whether it had that object in view or not. Memorial Day, as observed throughout the United States, is an annual reminder of the bravery of our race and a pledge that our coming generations shall act bravely. If they do then strife has ceased, for true bravery brooks no heated contests, nurtures no animosity, but cements friendship. Memorial Day with its floral decorations is to our nation what the rainbow was to man-a harbinger of peace.

MORTUARY RECORD.

A few of our former Comrades have been detached

from further service in our Department during the past year, by order of the Supreme Commander, and have been mustered into the ranks of the Celestial Army where they have preceded us by a few days only and where we hope, by Divine mercy, to serve with them throughout the countless ages of eternity.

Negley Post No. 1 misses three Comrades: D. R. Clendenin, formerly of the Eighth Illinois Cavalry; Thomac Jackson, who served in the navy; Hugh W. Maxwell, whose eloquent and dignified response to "The Judiciary" at the G. A. R. banquet at Tucson in 1893 was one of those addresses worthy to be remembered for a lifetime.

Burnside Post No. 2 lost one Comrade: J. F. Zeigler, of the Eighth California Volunteers.

Owen Post No. 5 mourns for three Comrades: Edward Ennis, who served in the navy; W. S. Millis of the One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Ohio Infantry; W. T. Woods of the Seventh California Infantry.

Alexander Post No. 6 regrets the loss of two Comrades: John O. Dunlap; Patrick Shanley, Fifth U. S. Infantry, who was present at our last Encampment and served as a member of our Council of Administration.

Sedgwick Post No. 10 loses one Comrade: John E. Farnsworth, whose war record as a scout was of a thrilling and remarkable character.

PENSIONS.

In the discussion of the subject of pensions I cannot avoid viewing it from the pitiful aspect. The veteran who has been growing weaker by the drain of disease has also become poorer because of the loss of ability to earn a living, in most instances must become a public charge. If so, the question is not whether he shall be supported, but by whom the support should be given. Shall it be by the Country which owes a return of the expenditure of manly vigor spent in her support, or by the County in the poorhouse among the profligate and criminally negligent?

"It is to them the Nation owes an everlasting debt;

"They kept the Stars in the field of blue,

"They brought the States to allegiance true.

"To them the Nation's life is due,

"And the Nation should ne'er forget."

I do not need to discuss the pension question. It can scarcely be called a question. I am confident that almost the entire nation cheerfully endorses the system which has been adopted, and I believe there cannot be any opposition except on the part of a class of men who never had any love of country in their souls, and whose only idea of patriotism is to obtain political spoils. I have been greatly pleased at the result of the searching investigation made lately into the cowardly reports spread to the effect that a great portion of the pension roll was fraudulent. Out of several hundred thousand cases inquired into only about two score of such instances could be found.

THE G. A. R. BUTTON.

The Council of Administration prepared and submitted to the last Legislature, as directed by the Encampment of last year, an act for the prevention of the unlawful wearing of the G. A. R. button or other insignia. But the Legislature refused to pass such a law. I hope the next Encampment will authorize another attempt before the next Legislature, believing it likely to be successfully carried, for I can scarcely conceive that another Legislative body elected by the citizens of Arizona can be got together, a majority of whom would refuse to legislate concerning such a peculiar species of fraud, and by their action shield imposters in their raids on charity funds. Legislatures in Colorado, Indiana, New York and elsewhere did not hesitate when petitioned but immediately and cheerfully enacted the laws. The people of this country have a high respect for that little bronze button, and if an appeal for assistance comes from behind it help is granted first and inquiry is made afterward. But in Arizona we must be

cautious for the impostor is yet permitted a decided advantage.

THE WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

The Woman's Relief Corps has received an impetus in Arizona which I hope may more firmly establish that organization by our side. The Post at Globe has habitually donated for relief through the National Headquarters. The Post at Phoenix has been of much practical help to Owen Post No. 5. In addition to the ordinary cases of relief we are under obligations for the funds with which to pay for our cemetery. The new Post at Prescott has a good field and will soon be doing excellent sustaining work for Barrett Post. Other Posts should be organized in our department. We need all of the help obtainable and are truly grateful for all that is rendered from any source, but none is so heartily desired and so sincerely enjoyed as that bestowed by the loyalty of our gentle mannered sisters.

SONS OF VETERANS.

The Sons of Veterans does not, as an organization, seem to take a strong hold on the youth of Arizona. Why is it? Camps have been established but they do not thrive. Is it because of any lack of interest on our part? It has seemed to me so. It is my belief that if they should be embraced in our ranks—as a second division—and given a part of the responsibility of maintaining the Order they must of necessity take the greater interest caused by part ownership. To be sure they cannot be veterans, but they may do a veteran's work. They may not have been members of the Grand Army that did duty during the sixties, but they may be members of a Grand Army of loyal hearts now and evermore.

ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP.

I notice that in Massachussetts and in some other States a new custom is prevailing, that of electing to Associate Membership citizens who have been conspicuous for loyalty and who so honor and esteem the G. A. R. that they request the privilege of personally subscribing to its principles and an opportunity to contribute regularly to its support. They do not become active members and Honorary Memberships are not yet permitted, but there appears to me no possible objection to creating a list of subscribing citizens who may be denominated Associate Members and who may assist at all public exercises and upon whose hearty interest and active co-operation we may at all times depend.

DROPPED MEMBERS.

It is a matter of sincere regret that so many of our Comrades are unable to maintain their membership and are dropped for non-payment of dues. I would seriously advise each Post to carry all the old members on their lists so long as they are unable to pay and are willing to be active members, but of course I cannot advise the retention of a member who is able to pay and is not liberal hearted enough to do so.

CLOSING REMARKS.

Our Department is small in numbers but large in its field. The work necessary to maintain it is considerable and has been well done by my associates, whose reports are herewith submitted to you. I feel it a pleasure as well as a duty to congratulate each of my Staff upon the readiness and efficiency shown in the performance of their several tasks.

Our numbers cannot increase much, but may decrease slightly. Yet, with the warm approval of our fellow citizens and the *esprit du corps* well maintained among our Comrades, we shall, for years to come, be a strong band of men with naught but the welfare of our fellow men at heart.

Comrades, I can hardly express in adequate terms the pride and pleasure I have felt in the discharge of the duties of Department Commander. That you have reposed such implicit confidence in me has been my sustaining force. I was not cognizant of any element or of any act of mine that should cause preferment. I was, as I have heretofore often asserted, proud of the fact that I had been permitted to take a part in the great War of the Rebellion. As years roll by and I more fully comprehend the importance of the deed, I am more and more thankful that in that one respect I lived not in vain. membership, and yours equally, in this Order, depend on that act in our earlier lives. Ours is the only secret benevolent order of its kind. It is distinctively honorable and we should more and more fully appreciate it. Our enlistment during the war was a truly patriotic act, born of a nation's necessity and prompted by stirring scenes. Our deportment in camp and on the field, on land and on sea, was generated by excitement and necessity and our volunteers stood the tests of contest with brave, unflinching hearts. We tested the times that tried men's souls. and having accomplished our tasks, returned to the ordinary walks of life. We had fulfilled the terms of our engagement and were settling into the quiet enjoyment of the land we loved, the more because we had helped to save it, when new necessities confronted us. After the whirl of war, after the smoke of battle had passed away, and martial law was no longer the controlling power, our country was preserved intact, to be sure, but it must be maintained; an army had been dispersed but its members must be sustained; a war was finished, but in its wake The new conditions was desolation and bereavement. created new responsibilities. The spirit of lovalty had to be preserved; the maimed, the sick, the widowed and the fatherless had to be supported and protected. How and by whom was this new work to be done? The solution of this problem was the conception of an Order to systematically engage in this work and the G. A. R. was cre-We were called to a new enlistment, to reconse crate our lives to the cause of loyalty and humanity. The response was grand. A half million of veterans

volunteered for the new service and have shown constant devotion thereto for more than a quarter of a century. We, my Comrades, are of this consecrated band and we are not yet weary of well doing; our presence here attests that fact.

Comrades. I greet you! May you be long spared to continue your noble work for the good of our country and for the benefit of mankind. May you long rejoice in a nation's gratitude and in the blessings of our nation's God. And may we who were associated together in early life on the tented field in freedom's cause and who, during later years have been banded together in earnest efforts for good, be again re-united in the great hereafter where there shall be no wars or rumors of war, but all shall be sweet peace.

It is unfortunate that so many Post Officers fail to realize the necessity of making prompt reports, as required by the Rules and Regulations. This duty should be impressed upon them. Some Posts furnish a list of officers elect, of delegates to the Department Encampment, corrected Roster of Post, etc., only after repeated orders, while others furnish them promptly on time.

Herewith find a list of suspended and dropped members of this department. It is very large. There does not seem to be any excuse for this. No doubt a personal appeal would save nine-tenths of these to us. A formal "dun" through the postoffice is overlooked. We cannot afford to have these Comrades "drop out of ranks;" they cannot afford to do so.

Counting the suspended, dropped, those who belong to other Departments and those who have never joined the G. A. R., there are more old Comrades in Arizona today outside our ranks than on our rolls. This ought not to be. Let each Comrade of this Department resolve that it shall not be. Under the Amended Rules and Regulations it costs but little for suspended or dropped Comrades to be re-instated. Let us work to have all these restored to our rolls the coming year. If a Comrade is so unfortunate in business that he cannot pay his dues, remit them. If the Post cannot live without the dues then I am in favor of raising a Volunteer Department Fund to pay the dues of each Comrade who really wants to retain his membership and is in every respect worthy a place among us; and the same for the initiation of those who cannot afford to pay.

Then let us make a united assault all along the lines and strive to influence every Comrade in Arizona, who has a membership in other Departments, to transfer to this.

Where they live too remote to attend any Post meetings, make provisions that they may become members by paying only one-half annual dues, or even less, if they pay less in the Departments to which they now belong. Impress upon them the importance of keeping step with their Comrades in Arizona. This can only be done, as it should be, by joining our ranks.

When we come together one year hence, no old Comrade in arms should be outside the ranks of the G. A. R. Will you work for it?

When you find a thoroughly worthy Comrade who

cannot afford to pay initiation, you can find some one who will pay for him; if not in your Post or town, then in the Department. Let us have full reports on these matters from each Post, at the next Department Encampment, so that we may know the names or every old Comrade in Arizona, whether a member of the G. A. R. or not. Which will be the banner Post?

Permit me to return to you and the Officers and Comrades of the Department with whom I have had official relations, my sincere thanks for the uniform coursesy with which I have been treated.

COMRADE:—In accordance with rules and regulations, I submit the following as my report for the past term:

In reference to the resolution passed by the last Encampment directing the A. Q. M. G. to provide for Past Department Commanders, a badge with an extra bar under the eagle bearing name of Arizona and showing date of service, would say that there was quite a diversity of opinion as to what was really meant. Some of the Comrades claimed that a special badge was meant, but according to rules and regulations of the Order none other could be furnished excepting a regulation badge, so after conference with Past Department Commander Schwartz. Commander Belden and A. G. Sampson, it was decided to order silver bars with Arizona and date of service on them, Comrade Schwartz saying that was what he

intended it to be when he introduced the resolution. So after corresponding with different parties in reference to same, I ordered eight silver bars from E. Berman, of Los Angeles, Cal. I sent one to each of the following Past Department Commanders: Grow, Coats, Schwartz, Sampson and Snyder. Comrade Sampson returned the one sent him, stating that he didn't think that it was exactly what was ordered by the Encampment.

During the past year the A. A. G. called on me for salary that he thought was allowed by the last Encampment, but not finding any authority in the proceedings for such expenditure I wrote to Comrade Brown who acted as A. A. G. at the Encampment, and received the following from him. (Original herewith.)

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT INSPECTOR.

PHOENIX, Arizona, Feb. 9th, 1895.

A. J. Sampson, A. A. G .:

COMRADE:—I have the honor to submit the followlowing annual report as Inspector of the Department of Arizona, for the year ending December 31st, 1894:

Negley Post, No. 1, of Tucson, meets every first Monday in each month at G. A. R. Hall. Has 77 members in good standing; ritual work partly committed to memory. Officers, Guards and Members uniformed and equipped. Has 4 muskets; not all of the officers are regular in their attendance; 40 per cent. of members

residing in city are regular in attendance and exhibit an interest in the Post.

Records complete and well kept. Orders received, regularly read and obeyed. All reports and orders have been forwarded.

Charge for Mustering in.... \$2,00 Annual dues..... 4.00.

No relief fund. Charity expended by members, over \$100.00. No money or securities in hands of Quartermaster. Owns property of the value of \$412.65. Has camp of Sons of Veterans, and the prospects of Post are good.

This Post presented flags to the Indian School, and to School District No. 1.

Post has a cemetery enclosed and properly laid out. Two members are in the Soldiers' Home and two have died.

Burnside Post, No. 2, of Tombstone, meets the fourth Wednesday of each month in G. A. R. Hall.

Has 19 members in good standing; work in the ritual committed to memory and properly performed.

Officers and Guards partly uniformed and equipped; members are not; 4 muskets are owned by the Post.

Officers and members are regular in their attendance and exhibit an interest in the Post. Records complete and well kept. Orders received, regularly read and obeyed. All reports and dues have been forwarded.

> Charge for mustering in..... \$2.00. Annual dues...... 6.00.

There is no relief fund, and no report of charity expended during the year.

Money and securities in hands of Quartermaster, \$63.36. Prospects of Post are poor on account of hard times. Four school houses represented in the Post are supplied with United States flags.

Barrett Post, No. 3. of Prescott, holds meetings first and third Tuesdays in each month at Odd Fellows Hall. Has 44 members in good standing; work in ritual com-

mitted to memory and properly performed. Officers, Guards and members partly uniformed and equipped; has 2 muskets. Officers and members are not regular in attendance, and only a few exhibit an interest in the Post.

Records are complete and well kept. Orders received, read and obeyed. All reports and dues have been forwarded.

Charge for mustering in...... \$2.00.
Annual dues...... 4.00.

No relief fund. Amount expended for charity, \$13.30. Money and securities in hands of Quartermaster, \$50.00; value of other property owned by the Post, \$55.00. Prospects of the Post good.

Thirty-eight School Districts represented, of which 20 are supplied with flags.

Assistant Inspector says: "Attendance at Post meetings small during the past year, owing to the fact that the majority of the members are scattered all over the county. The P. C. states that there is a prospect of a material increase in the membership of the Post."

An effort to organize a Camp of Sons of Veterans heretofore made, has failed, although there is enough material on hand. I have urged the making of another effort; have also recommended the re-organization of the Woman's Relief Crops. There was a W. R. C. here some six months ago.

The majority of the members of the Post lack the means to provide themselves with uniforms, and the Post fund is too small to purchase arms and other equippments.

Ransom Post, No. 4, of Flagstaff, holds meetings second and last Saturdays in each month at G. A. R. Hall. Has 26 members in good standing; work in the ritual partially committed to memory.

Officers, Guards and members uniformed and equipped; has no muskets.

Officers and members regular in attendance, and exhibit an interest in the Post.

Records complete and well kept; orders received, read and obeyed. All reports and dues have been forwarded.

Officers, Guards and members partly uniformed; no muskets owned by the Post.

Officers and members regular in attendance and exhibit interest in the Post. Records complete and well kept. Orders received, read and obeyed. All reports and dues have been forwarded.

No relief fund. Expended for charity, \$15.25. Money and securities in hands of Quartermaster, \$70.85. Value of other property owned by Post, \$260.00.

There is a W. R. C. connected with the Post, and a Camp of Sons of Veterans. The Relief Corps is in good working order and has been of much benefit to the Post. The Sons of Veterans have not met for some time, but an effort is being made to infuse new life into the Camp, with prospects of success.

Nearly all the School Districts represented by the Post are supplied with flags.

Prospects of the Post are very good. Post owns a cemetery properly laid out and enclosed.

Alexander Post, No. 6, of Globe, meets second and fourth Saturdays in each month. Has 23 members in good standing; work in ritual not committed to memory.

Officers, Guards and members are not uniformed and equipped; no muskets owned by the Post.

Only a few of the officers and members are regular in attendance. Those who attend exhibit an interest in the Post, and the records are complete and well kept. Orders received, read and obeyed.

All reports and dues have been forwarded.

Charge for mustering in...... \$5.00.

Annual dues...... 6.00.

No relief fund. No report of money expended for charity. Money and securities in hands of Quartermaster, \$17.95. Value of other property owned by the Post, \$75.00.

Woman's Relief Corps connected with Post. Prospects of Post fair.

Three School Districts represented in Post; number of flags not known.

Assistant Inspector says: "In regard to negative answers to so many questions in this report, and particularly as to non-attendance of members, I would say in extenuation, that since the fire here in July last, we have had no suitable room in which to meet, every building of that description having been destroyed; consequently our meetings have been irregular, and must of necessity be so, until new buildings are erected.

"Also, many of our members are scattered over the county, and so remote from this place that it is quite impossible for them to attend regularly, although on funeral occasions and Memorial Day, we always have a sufficient number present to make a very creditable showing."

Logan Post, No. 7, of Tempe, has 6 members in good standing. This Post has not held regular meetings for the past year. The old membership has become scattered and it is difficult to secure a quorum.

The Department officers are making an effort to re-

vive this Post, and as there is good material in the vicinity to recruit from, I have no doubt but that the Post will be in good working order in a short time, and will show up strong in next annual report

The per capita tax of this Post has been forwarded.

Stebbins Post, No. 8, at Bisbee. This Post surrendered its Charter January 28th, 1894, and the members were granted transfer cards by the Department Commander,

Fremont Post, No. 9, of Yuma, meets second and fourth Saturdays in each month at the court house. Has 12 members in good standing; work in ritual not committed to memory.

Officers, Guards and members not uniformed; owns no muskets.

Officers and members are not regular in attendance and exhibit very little interest in the Post.

Records good. Orders received, read and obeyed. All reports and dues have been forwarded.

No relief fund. Amount expended for charity, \$5. Money and securities in hands of Quartermaster, \$32.55. Value of other property owned by Post, \$34.20. Prospects of the Post, poor.

Six School Districts represented, but only one supplied with flag.

Sedgwick Post, No. 10, of Williams, is a new Post of 12 members. No report of inspection of the Post has been received.

The per capita tax has been forwarded, and I understand the prospects of the Post are good.

- 3rd. That part of the address relating to Associate Members commends itself to your committee; we recommend that Comrades be urged to give earnest thought to this recommendation.
- 4th. That part of the address concerning Pensions is most gratifying, and it is a source of pride and pleasure to every Comrade to know that the allegations of fraud,

upon which have been based so many attacks upon our Pension laws, and which were the fruitful source of so many unjust aspersions upon our Order, have so little foundation in fact.

Resolved, That the compensation of the Assistant Adjutant General for the coming year be fixed at \$50, and that of the Assistant Quartermaster General at \$25, to be paid if they attend the next Department Encampment, otherwise they shall only receive one-half of the above amounts.

All Comrades present, and invited guests, partook of a most enjoyable feast, prepared by Ransom Post, at 6 p. m.

At 8 o'clock p. m. public exercises were held in Babbitt's Hall and the newly elected Department officers were installed, when the Department Encampment adjourned.

Chap. 5, Article 5, Section 1, of the Rules and Regulations, was amended at the National Encampment of 1893, as follows: "An annual inspection of each Post shall be made between September 1st and December 20th, by the Assistant Inspector, Department Officer, or other Comrade assigned to such duty, the report of the same to be made to the Inspector of the Department not later than January 1st. The Inspector shall consolidate the reports of his assistants for the information of the Commander, and shall furnish copies of such consolidated reports to the Inspector General within thirty days after the completion of the inspection of their several Departments,"
- II. Chap. 2, Article 7, Section 1, was amended as follows: "No installation of officers shall be held at the first meeting in January until the Post has been inspected. The installing officer shall ascertain whether or not the Post has been inspected for the previous year; if it has not, he shall proceed to the work of inspection, deferring installation of officers until its completion; the Senior Past Post Commander present, and, if none are present, the Post Inspector, will act as installing officer in each Post at the first meeting in January, 1895."
- III. Post Inspectors will take notice of the above rules. They will receive blanks from the Department Inspector, Comrade Chas, H. Knapp, Phoenix, which it is their duty to fill out properly and return prior to January 1st.
- IV. Blanks for all semi-annual returns accompany this order and Post Commanders are held personally responsible for their proper return. Two sets are sent and but one set should be returned. All returns should be sent in one package by the Post Adjutant under the direction of the Post Commander and addressed to Assistant Adjutant General A. J. Sampson, Phoenix.
- V. The reports of Adjutant and Quartermaster shall agree and commence with the number found written

upon the blanks. The report of the Quartermaster must be accompanied by a Money Order, either Postal or Express, for thirty cents (30c.) for each member returned as in good standing, payable to Assistant Quartermaster General, John Gray, Phoenix.

- VI. Each Post should assist to develop and foster the growth of all kindred organizations, the Woman's Relief Corps and the Sons of Veterans, and special attention is called to an accompanying "Address to the G. A. R.," bearing the endorsement of the Commander-in-Chief of the G. A. R. Comrades, see to it that a Camp of Sons of Veterans is organized at once. This ought to be done. It will not be long till our work is ended. Unless we arrange for the Sons of Veterans to take our places we will not have discharged our duty to ourselves. to them or to the country,
- VII. Camp fires are specially commended as means of promoting the welfare of our Posts, particularly when the friends of the Order are invited to participate, and on such occasions the Woman's Relief Corps and the Sons of Veterans should take an active part. Posts will derive considerable advantage by holding a series of such entertainments during the winter season.
- VIII. Attention is called to the fact that histories and other text books are published which do not deal fairly with the facts pertaining to the War of the Rebellion, but are issued for sale "down south." It is the special duty of the Grand Army to be watchful of this matter and keep disloyal literature out of homes and schools.
- IX. Acting under the instructions of the Seventh Annual Encampment the Assistant Quartermaster General has obtained the solid silver bars, upon which is the name "Arizona" in raised letters and a date underneath, for each Past Department Commander to wear upon the ribbon of the rank strap. These will be distributed immediately and prompt acknowledgment of the receipt of same will be made.

III. The Post Commander of Ransom Post No. 4, will detail one Comrade from his Post to act as Officer of the Day, and one Comrade to act as Officer of the Guard

during the sitting of the Encampment.

IV. It is understood that the Comrades of Post No. 4, and the citizens of Flagstaff generally, are making special effort to entertain the members of the Encampment, preparing, among other things, for a trip to the Grand Canon of the Colorado. This year in addition to the pleasure of a visit to the cool, pine-clad hills and the enjoyment of the delights of the hospitality of our Flagstaff neighbors, we are afforded reasonable and easy transportation, and every Comrade who can afford the vacation, may not only expect to thoroughly enjoy himself, but will promote the general happiness by attending this Encampment. Several Comrades have already made arrangements to take their wives and families. The transportation rates will extend to all who attend, either as members of the G. A. R., the Woman's Relief Corps, or the Sons of Veterans.

V. If sufficient members attend to hold a convention of either of the adjunct associations, the Woman's Relief Corps or the Sons of Veterans, such meeting, although of an informal character, will be held, during the Encampment and under its auspices, for the purpose of encouraging the development of these organizations in Arizona.

VI. The rates of transportation will be as follows: Over the Southern Pacific Railroad, one and one-fifth fare for the round trip. Over the Maricopa & Phoenix Railroad, one and one-third fare; and over the Santa Fe,

Prescott & Phoenix, or over the Atlantic and Pacific Railways, one full fare. Certificates of attendance will be furnished by Assistant Adjutant General Sampson upon application at Flagstaff. Each person will pay full fare to Flagstaff and the return tickets will be given at the reduced rate.

VII. The following appointments are announced: Comrade Ed. Schwartz, of Owen Post No. 5. as Special Aid-de-Camp, to the Commander in Chief, "relative to the subject of Military Instruction in the Public Schools." Comrade W. A. Ogden, of Sedgwick Post No. 10, as Aid-de-Camp on the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, Comrade Chas H. Knapp, of Owen Post No. 5, as Assistant Inspector General. They will be respected and obeyed accordingly.

VIII. Preperations are now being made for the National Encampment, to be held this year at Louisville, Kentucky. Any one desiring information as the railroad rates, hotel rates, free quarters, re unions, etc., can obtain the same by communicating with J. H. Milliken, Director General, G. A. R. Committee, Louisville, Ky.

IX. Comrade Nathaniel White (service unknown,) is supposed to have been killed in Arizona during 1881 or 1882. If any one has information concerning this matter he is specially requested to make it known to these Headquarters. By order of





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PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

Ninth Annual Encampment

OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF ARIZONA,

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Ninth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at the hall of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5, in the city of Phœnix, at 9 a. m., Tuesday, April 7, 1896, and was called to order by Department Commander W. F. R. Schindler.

Comrade Gilbert D. Gray, of J. W. Owen Post, reported as Officer of the Day, and Comrade J. D. Monihon, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard.

General Order No. 3, convening the Encampment, was read, and the roll of Department Officers called. The Senior Vice Commander and the Junior Vice Commander, the Medical Director, the Department Chaplain, the Chief Mustering Officer and the Department Inspector were reported absent. Comrade Parker stated that the absence of Junior Vice Commander C. H. Knapp was due to a sudden attack of sickness. The Department Commander appointed Comrade Geo. Hoxworth of Ransom Post, Senior Vice Commander; Comrade J. M. Evans of J. W. Owen Post, Junior Vice Commander; and Comrade C. P.

Wilson of Negley Post, Chaplain, pro tem., and the Encampment was opened in due form.

Comrade Creamer, a member of the Committee on Credentials, being unable to be present, the vacancy was filled by the appointment of Comrade P. P. Parker, of J. W. Owen Post. The Commander also appointed Comrades J. J. Hill of Negley Post, W. F. Bradley of Burnside Post, and A. J. Sampson of Owen Post, a Committee on Resolutions.

On motion, duly seconded, the report was adopted and the Committee discharged.

The Commander then delivered the following address:

ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

COMRADES:

When at the last Encampment you elected me your Commander, I expressed the hope that at the end of my administration you might have no cause to regret your action. Whatever your verdict may be, the satisfaction remains with me of knowing that I have endeavored as far as has been in my power to perform the duties of the office faithfully and impartially. I trust that I have not lowered the standard set by those distinguished comrades who have preceded me.

Strong and repeated appeals have been made during the year to increase our membership, espec. ially by re-instatement of delinquent members. Whilst the majority of the Posts show an increase over last year, one Post reports a serious decrease, principally by suspension. It is indeed unfortunate that so many of our comrades suffer themselves to be dropped for non-payment of dues. It is true that during the last few years great financial depression has caused hard times and that at such times we one and all lose our enthusiasm, but it is also a fact that we find comrades on the suspension list who are financially well able to retain their membership. There must be some other cause for their action. The Post officers should impartially investigate such cases and apply a remedy where possible.

I have visited the northern Posts during the year, but regret that business demands and a severe attack of "la grippe" compelled me to forego my intended trip to the southern Posts planned for February. From personal observation and reports received I find that our comrades are generally enthusiastic, although laboring under great disadvantages; and desirous of keeping up the standard of the Posts.

This Department can boast of not having had a single case of court martial since its organization. This enviable record has been kept up during my administration.

It has been my privilege to visit the Twenty-Ninth National Encampment at Louisville. Senior Vice Department Commander J. Guthrie Savage and Department Judge Advocate A. J. Sampson (who acted as Assistant Adjutant General during the Encampment) also attended its session, and rendered valuable services. Comrade C. B. Knapp of Barrett Post carried the heavy Department banner during the parade, for which arduous task great praise is

due him. Comrade Andrews, a resident of Phœnix, also visited Louisville during the Encampment. So that—considering the long distance to be travelled and the heavy expenses entailed—the Department was creditably represented. These Encampments mark the epochs of the history of our order; they are, as it were, the milestones on our line of march to the haven of eternal rest.

The Department is fortunate in having, since June last, lost by muster out by order of the Supreme Commander above only four comrades. Let us hope that our mortuary report will be equally small for several years to come.

The subject of pensions has been discussed so thoroughly year after year, that hardly anything can be added. We are growing older and weaker and are less able to earn a living. Injuries received when in active service during the war, hardly noticed then, begin to make themselves felt in earnest. But the witnesses to such injuries are at this late day scattered far and wide, and in nine cases out of ten it is impossible to obtain their testimony. The invalids' claim for pension is consequently ignored. To simplify matters Congress should give us a service pension. The widows of the ex-generals and of the ex-privates should also be treated alike.

As a matter of fact, the G.A.R. button is worn in this Territory by comrades who have long ago ceased to be members of the order, and also by persons who have never been entitled to wear it. It is to be hoped that this Encampment will authorize another effort before the next Legislature for the passage of an act, punishing the unlawful wearing of the button or other official insignia of the G.A.R. Such an effort ought to be successful.

The members of the W. R. C. of Globe, Phænix and Prescott have been a great help to their Posts. I desire here to express my high esteem for their acts

of unselfish devotion and deeds of charity in aid of needy and suffering veterans, and to commend them to the fostering care of our order. I sincerely hope that the informal convention now in session in this city will result in the establishment of additional Corps in the Department. God bless the women.

Efforts have been made to organize and reorganize Camps of Sons of Veterans in Arizona, but thus far without success. The organization does not seem to thrive in this Territory. The Sons ought to be brought into closer alliance with the G. A. R.

The custom inaugurated in some States of electing citizens who sympathize with the G. A. R., and desire to contribute regularly to its support, to associate membership, seems to be an unobjectionable one, and might be tried here.

Some of our Posts are very small, and in order to retain their membership it will undoubtedly be necessary to draw into their folds all veterans who reside within their jurisdiction. Whether this might best be done by the establishment of Out-Posts or Picket-Posts—the members of which should pay a smaller per capita tax than the resident members of the parent Post—or otherwise, will be a fit subject for the consideration of the incoming administration.

I would urge this Encampment to ask our next Legislature to make provisions for the purchase of the National flags which should float over every school house in the Territory. As our schools are fostered by the Government, they are institutions of the Government, and as such should float the National standard, so that the child on receiving the benefit of a free education will naturally associate Government acts with all that is kind and good. At the last session of the Territorial Teachers' Association, held in Prescott, I asked the teachers to use their best endeavors to have a flag provided for each district. The Posts in the Territory have done much

toward providing school districts with flags, but are financially unable to provide them for all the districts, and the task properly belongs to the School

Department.

The income of the Department is small, and it requires the closest economy to make both ends meet. No expenditures ought to be authorized which are not absolutely necessary. The report of the Assistant Quartermaster General gives a detailed account of the income and disbursements.

In conclusion, I desire to express my sense of obligation for services rendered by my associate officers, by my personal staff and the Council of Administration. Such reports as have come into my hands are hereby submitted to you. In returning to you the trust your suffrages imposed, permit me to tender my most sincere thanks for the honor you have conferred on me, and for your loyal assistance; and now, in handing over the command of this Department to my successor, whom you will chose at this Encampment, I am happy to state it is with love and respect to every comrade. "May the Lord love you and not call for you too soon."

COMRADE: In compliance with our rules and

regulations, I have the honor to herewith submit the annual report of this office.

The number of members of this Department is slightly decreasing, notwithstanding the strenuous efforts all along the line to bring the old soldiers still remaining outside of our organization (and there are many of them in this Territory) within our folds.

The report of Sedgwick Post No. 10 came too late for my consolidated report for the second term of 1895; the Post report shows eight members in good standing, whilst my report credits it with ten members. Post No. 7 has not furnished any reports for the last few years; it is hoped that new life may be infused into it.

The list of suspended members is too large to make comfortable reading (although it is smaller, than last year), owing to the falling off in membership of Negley Post No. 1. I can do no better than to draw the attention of the Encampment to the excellent suggestions of my predecessor, Comrade A. I. Sampson, as to personal appeals to delinquents. restoration of those unable to pay their dues, and transfer of every worthy comrade now residing in Arizona, who is a member of another Department, to this. I would also urge every officer of the different Posts to try while they are in office to bring the standing of their Posts up to a little higher grade than their former comrades left it, and to attend to their duties as they would attend to their own private business.

This Department being small in the number of Posts, the greater part of the directory work from this office has been done by letter, in order to lessen the expense for printing, and few orders have been issued.

The relationship and friendly feeling that has existed between these headquarters and throughout the Department has been good so far as I can understand, and I feel grateful to you and the balance of Department officers and comrades for the courtesy shown me.

On motion, the Encampment adjourned until 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Encampment was called to order at 2 p. m.

The report of the committee on the address of the Department Commander was presented and adopted, as follows:

Be it resolved, That the recommendations made by the Department Commander in his annual address before the Ninth Annual Encampment be carried out by the incoming Department officers, in so far as it is possible for them so to do, and that a committee of three be appointed to attend to the matter of the badge and button before the next Territorial Legislature.

To the Commander, Officers and Members of the Department of Arizona, G. A. R.

SIRS AND COMRADES: We, your Council of Administration, respectfully report that we have examined the books and vouchers of the Assistant Quartermaster General and find them correct.

On motion, the following committee was appointed to investigate the matter of associate membership and report at the Tenth Department Encampment: Comrades W. F. Bradley of Burnside Post, James Finley of Negley Post and W. H. Pierce of Ransom Post.

The Encampment then proceeded to the election of officers for the ensuing year.

Comrade Scott nominated Comrade A. J. Sampson, of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5, for Department Commander, Comrades Finley and Rees seconding the nomination. On motion, the nomination was closed

and the Assistant Adjutant General instructed to cast the ballot of the Encampment for Comrade A. J. Sampson. This being done, the Commander declared Comrade A. J. Sampson duly elected Commander of the Department for the ensuing year.

There being only one nomination for each of the remaining offices to be filled, the Assistant Adjutant General was in each case instructed by the Encampment to cast its ballot for the nominee, which was done, and the following comrades were, after each ballot so cast, declared duly elected.

- Comrade James Finley, of Negley Post, No. 1, Member Council of Administration.
- Comrade A. L. Grow, of Burnside Post, No. 2, Member Council of Administration.
- Comrade S. C. Rees, of Barrett Post, No. 3, Member Council of Administration.
- Comrade Geo. Hoxworth, of Ransom Post, No. 4, Member Council of Administration.
- Comrade J. W. Dorrington, of Fremont Post, No. 9, Member Council of Administration.

On motion, Prescott was unanimously selected as the place for holding the Tenth Department Encampment, and the fixing of the date was left to the Council of Administration.

Resolved, That the outgoing Department Commander be and is hereby authorized to have the pro-

ceedings of this Encampment, the orders issued during his administration, and the usual Department and Post rosters printed.

Resolved, That the Council of Administration may in their discretion relieve the Assistant Quartermaster General from furnishing bonds.

The Committee on Resolutions then presented the following resolutions, which on motion were adopted:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, have examined the various reports referred to us, and find them correct and proper in every respect.

That our thanks are hereby extended to the Santa Fe, Prescott & Phœnix, the Maricopa & Phœnix, the Southern Pacific, and the Atlantic & Pacific railroads for a one-fare rate, and to the New Mexico & Arizona railroad for a one-and-a-third fare to this Encampment.

That we hereby extend to the members of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5, and of J. W. Owen Relief Corps, and to the citizens of Phœnix, our hearty thanks for the courtesies extended to the visiting comrades of the Ninth Annual Session of the G. A. R. Encampment of Arizona.

That our representatives and delegates to the Thirtieth National Encampment be requested to secure a decision as to whether comrades may be retained in good standing in the Posts by a remission of dues and yet not subject to payment of the per capita tax. If this be not possible under the R. and R., as now in force, then we request them to use their best efforts to have the R. and R. so amended.

Unanimously resolved, that in addition to the members provided for in Article II, Chapter 3, of the Rules and Regulations of the G. A. R., the representatives to our succeeding Department Encampments shall be members selected by the several Posts, in the

ratio of one delegate and one alternate for each ten members or a fraction over one-half of ten, and that all Past Post Commanders in good standing in their respective Posts shall be permanent members of our Encampments.

Resolved. That a committee of five, with Comrade Scott as chairman, be appointed to wait, after the close of the Encampment, on the informal convention of the W. R. C., now in session, and convey to them the respects and good will of the Encampment.

The Commander appointed as additional members of the committee, Comrades, Hill, Hoxworth, Burrows and Finley.



Grand Army of the Republic.

The Tenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at the hall of Barrett Post No. 3, in the City of Prescott, at 10:30 a. m., May 18th, 1897, and was called to order by Assistant Adjutant General, I. M. Christy, in the absence of the Department Commander, and Senior and Junior Vice Department Commanders.

General Order No. 4, convening the En-

campment, was read.

The Assistant Adjutant General stated that owing to the absence of the Department Commander and Senior and Junior Vice Commanders, it would be necessary to elect a presiding officer.

On motion of Comrade Belden, seconded by Comrade Wilson, Comrade Past Department Commander W. F. R. Schindler, was unanimously elected to preside over the Encampment.

Comrade Wm. O'Neil, of Barrett Post No. 3,

reported as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Timothy Fell, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard.

The roll of Department Officers was called.

The Department Commander, Senior Vice Commander, Junior Vice Commander and Medi-

The following address of the Department Commander was then read.

Address of Department Commander.

#### COMRADES:

The trust you imposed in me one year since, is now returned to you, and I take my place in the ranks.

I have tried to do my duty, to honor that trust, and my only regret is that I have not seen more results.

I look into the face of some one who will succeed to this trust. I would not discourage you from accepting it, but would impress upon you the fact that it is one of responsibility, as well as honor. You will command a band of men who are now honored citizens, loyal to the principles of our government, as they were from sixtyone to sixty-five, when their hearts beat in unison with all loyal men for the maintenance of our national integrity, cost what it would. Of different religions and political faiths and engaged in the different business pursuits of life, they are one for the maintenance of the unity of this Nation. No more worthy men salute the stars and stripes to-day.

Comrades, the privilege of serving you, I prize as one of the greatest honors of my life. I trust I may have been of some benefit to you—to this Department. By general orders, by personal appeals and by numerous personal letters, I have tried to stem the tide of "suspension for non-payment of dues." In some cases, I know with success.

I beg of you, comrades, don't let your zeal in this matter lag, but as the sunset of life approaches, and your day goes out at its western gateway, and you are about to join the Grand Army beyond, may the benediction of comrades who would not be with us and of us, had it not been for your kind words and interest in them, rest upon you, and may you hear the approval of the Great Commander, "well done."

#### MEMBERSHIP.

The report of the Assistant Adjutant General shows a decrease in our membership of fifteen. Had it not been for the large number suspended by one Post, for non-payment of dues, we would be able to report an increase of members. I can but repeat the earnest appeals of my predecessors in urging the great importance of keeping all the old Comrades on our rolls and regaining those lost. If any are unable to pay dues, remit them, keep them with us. I specially appeal to the Commanders of the various posts to make this a matter of personal work and ambition the coming year. Write personal letters, not formal notices, and show your Comrades the importance of staying in our ranks and your interest in them.

During the year, three Comrades have been mustered

out of our ranks, into those of the great future. Their names and record appear in the mortuary report.

#### LEGISLATION.

The last Department Encampment appointed a committee to secure the passage of a law, by the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of Arizona, making it unlawful for any one, not entitled to do so, to wear the Grand Army of the Republic button or badge, and providing punishment therefor.

Comrade Parker, one of that committee, and a member of that legislative body, introduced a bill in the Legislature to that effect, which passed the lower House, but failed to become a law.

#### WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS.

In the dark days of war, our burdens would have been hard to bear, without the sympathy and encouragement of woman. In these days of peace, no organization is more worthy of support, in every possible way, of the Grand Army of the Republic, than the Woman's Relief Corps. Where organized, they have been a wonderful help to the Posts, and have contributed largely to the work of charity, and to social entertainments by co-operation in "camp-fires." making them a great success. These women are the representatives of the best type of American womanhood.

It is most desirable that every Post should have a Woman's Relief Corps.

#### SONS OF VETERANS.

In less than one generation more, the most of us shall have heard the assembly called for the last time. We ought to make it a matter of personal interest to organize the Sons of Veterans. This may be, and should be, one of the strongest, if not the strongest secret organization in the United States.

#### NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.

In company with Acting Assistant Adjutant General W. H. Ferguson, and delegate J. M. Evans, I at-

ended the Naional Encampment at St. Paul, last September.

No nation has ever witnessed such grand annual gatherings as the National Encampments of the Grand Army of the Republic. Nothing except Memorial Day serves so fully to instill into the minds of the rising generation, a spirit of patriotism as they do.

As requested by the last Department Encampment, I presented to the last National Encampment, the matter of changing the rules and regulations, so as to allow the remission of dues and good standing in Posts, without paying per capita tax, but the committee was opposed to it and that settled it. Your request was not concurred in.

#### POSTS.

During the year I visited all the Posts of the Department but three, and I regret that I was not able to visit them. To do so, would have required travelling nearly one thousand miles, at a heavy expense, a distance and expense greater than would be required in some of our eastern departments to visit a hundred Posts.

I tried my best, during the year, to resurrect the Post at Bisbee, but could not. Various excuses were given, why they could not.

When at Safford, on the 4th of July last, I secured the names of a dozen old soldiers, and felt confident for a time, that I would be able to institute a new Post there. But it finally failed. I hope my successor may have greater success with Bisbee and Safford than I.

#### MEMORIAL DAY.

Go from the inspiration of this Encampment to your respective Posts, resolved to make Memorial Day, 1897, more impressive than any preceding it. Frown down every attempt to make it a day of sports and excursions. Let it be observed, as it should be, as a *Memorial Day* of the dead. Strive to secure the co-operation of the Militia and other organizations, of the school children and the citizens generally.

The 30th coming on the Sabbath, Saturday, the 29th, will be observed. But let each Post see to it that appropriate services are held in some church, either on the Sabbath preceding, or on the 30th. Posts should attend such service in a body.

Let no grave remain ungarlanded on that day. Many old Comrades sleep far away from family and friends, and no loving one visits the grave to deck it with flowers and round up the little mound of clay. Once a year, at least, Comrades, we will thus remember our departed.

If any sleep in the Potters' field, see that they are removed before that day.

I congratulate you on the general good observance of Memorial Day in this Department.

#### CONCLUSIONS.

I hereby return my sincere thanks to all who have been associated with me during the year, in an official capacity, for their uniform courtesy and hearty co-operation, and to all the Comrades of the Department for their loyalty to our beloved order.

"Tattoo" of the year has sounded, soon it will be said, "lights out." May the "reveille" of the new year be the announcement of one that shall record, "not a single suspension for non-payment of dues;" one that shall witness greater growth in the two organizations so dear to us, the Woman's Relief Corps and the Sons of Veterans; one that shall rally the old guard and cause us to work as never before; one that shall cement us together, more firmly than ever, in the sublime principles of "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty."

On entering upon the duties of my office, there were nine (9) Posts with a total membership of 271. There are now nine (9) Posts with a membership of 256, showing a net loss in membership during the year of 15.

I wish to call the attention of the Encampment to the large list of suspended members, 65 in number.

I realize that during the business depression of the past few years, that it has been impossible for a great many to spare the money necessary to secure their re-instatement or to pay their dues if reinstated, but with the brightening prospects of future prosperity, which I feel is sure to come, we should be able by the necessary effort, to secure the re-instatement of most, if not all, the

suspended members, and also to recruit new members from the large number of old soldires residing in the Territory who have never joined the organization. Let us all put our shoulders to the wheel and see if we cannot by the next Department Encampment have a large increase in the membership.

The first attempt to erect a suitable and lasting soldiers' monument within our Territory has been made by J. W. Owen Post No. 5.

An ri inch cannon has been received by the Post from the United States authorities, and will soon be placed in a conspicuous place in the city on a handsome pedestal.

To the Department Commander and all the Department officers, also the officers of the different Posts in this Department, I wish to return my thanks for the kind and fraternal treatment I have received during the past year, and while I gladly lay aside the insignia of this office, I shall ever carry with me a kindly recollection of the past year's pleasant associations.

#### REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN.

OFFICE OF CHAPLAIN,

FLAGSTAFF, Arizona, May, 1896.

I have the honor to make this my report as Department Chaplain for 18,6 and 1897.

The reports from Post Chaplains show that Memorial Day and Memorial Sunday were generally observed.

Moved by Comrade Belden, seconded and carried that a memorial page be reserved in the printed proceedings for departed Comrades.

Comrade Schwartz moved that when we adjourn it be until 3:30 p. m., so the Comrades may attend the funeral of Comrade Sines' child.

On motion the Encampment adjourned until 3:30 p. m.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Encampment was called to order at 3:30 p.m.

On motion of Comrade Belden, seconded by Comrade Doran, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, It is now 32 years since the close of the late war, and

WHEREAS, It is in accordance with historic precedent that after the lapse of a suitable time some fitting recognition shall be made.

Resolved. That every veteran of the war of the Rebellion should receive a pension of at least \$8.00 per month.

On motion of Comrade Belden, duly seconded, the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General were allowed \$20 each for expenses in attending this Encampment.

The Council of Administration reported that they had examined the report of the Assistant Quartermaster General and found it correct. On motion the report was received and adopted.

Comrade Gray introduced the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The Veteran who applies to his country for the relief which a generous nation desires to bestow, finds that the Board of Examiners as now constituted, in many instances contain members who show a bitter hostility to the patriot. We demand that a reorganization of all the Boards in this Territory be made promptly.

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Commissioner of Pensions.

On motion, Tucson was unanimously selected as the place for holding the Eleventh Department Encampment, and the fixing of the date was left to the Council of Administration.

Comrade Powers, on behalf of the "Mining Exchange," extended a cordial invitation to the members to attend a meeting of that body this evening at 7:45 p. m., which was duly accepted.

The Encampment then proceeded to the election of officers for the ensuing year.

Comrade Powers nominated Comrade Geo. Hoxworth, of Ransom Post No. 4, for Department Commander, Comrade Wilson seconding the nomination.

On motion the nomination was closed and the Assistant Adjutant General instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Encampment for Comrade George Hoxworth. This being done, the Commander declared Comrade George Hoxworth duly elected Commander of the Department for the ensuing year.

Comrade Wilson nominated Comrade R. C. Powers, of Barrett Post No. 3, for Senior Vice Department Commander, and Comrade Boughton nominated Comrade Geo. D. Kendall, of same Post, for same position.

Both nominations having been seconded, a call of the roll was had, which resulted in Comrade Geo. D. Kendall receiving 15 votes and Comrade R. C. Powers receiving 9 votes.

The Commander declared that Comrade Geo. D. Kendall having a majority of all the ballots cast, was duly elected Senior Vice Department Commander for the ensuing year.

There being only one nomination for each of the remaining offices to be filled, they were each elected by acclamation, and the Comrades were after each ballot declared duly elected.

Comrade Ed. Schwartz, of Owen Post No. 5, member Council of Administration.

Comrade James Wiley, of Alexander Post No. 6, member Council of Administration.

Comrade J. W. Dorrington, of Fremont Post No. 9, member Council of Administration.

Comrade D. F. Phelan, of Sedgwick Post No. 10, member Council of Administration.

The Committee on Addresses, Reports and Resolutions then presented the following reports and resolutions, which were on motion duly seconded and unanimously adopted.

To the Tenth Annual Encampment, Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Arizona:

We, your committee to whom was referred the reports and resolutions, read and offered to this meeting, would most respectfully report as follows:

We have examined the annual address of the Department Commander and heartily endorse the sentiments expressed therein. We endorse the recommendations made for the building up of the Posts.

We fully endorse the Commander's remarks as to the value of the work done by the Woman's Relief Corps. Too much credit cannot be offered them by us. Whereever the Woman's Relief Corps has been established they have contributed in an eminent degree to the pleasure and prosperity of the Post.

We are grateful for the preservation of harmony and the ability to prosecute the work of all our Posts which is exhibited by the reports of the Assistant Adjutant General and the Assistant Quartermaster General.

We must expect to make a record of the mustering out of some of our Comrades each year, but this year we have been specially favored in this respect, having lost but three members.

We would recommend that a specially marked decoration should be made upon the graves of those who have died during the preceding year, at the time of decorating the graves on Memorial Day.

Resolved, That we fully appreciate the strong sympathy expressed and exhibited by many of those citizens who are not eligible to membership in our order, and believe that some stronger bond of association would be mutually beneficial. We therefore recommend that the Posts of our Department be authorized to elect such citizens who wish to assist in our fraternal, charitable and educational work, as associate members, and as such, to permit them to enjoy all privileges except those rights which it would be unlawful to grant.

Resolved, That while the report of the Assistant Adjutant General deprecates the fact that we do not show a very large amount to have been expended by the Posts of the Department for relief, the facts are that a large amount is expended and bestowed upon Veteraus, other than members of this order.

Therefore, we recommend that an itemized account shall be kept by the Post Quartermaster of all sums contributed, money value of all gifts bestowed, and all incidentals expended for the benefit of old soldiers, sailors and marines, and a complete report be included under the item of relief in the semi-annual report, and that a descriptive record be kept by the Post Adjutant of the death and burial of any old soldier, sailor or marine which occurs within the jurisdiction of his Post.

Resolved, That our thanks are hereby extended to the Santa Fe, Prescott & Phoenix, the Maricopa &

Phoenix, the Southern Pacific, and the Atlantic & Pacific Railroads for the one fare rate for round trip to this our Tenth Annual Encampment.

That we also extend to the members of Barrett Post No. 3, the Woman's Relief Corps, and the citizens of the city of Prescott, our thanks for the reception and hearty welcome to the delegates and visiting Comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic, at and during this our Tenth Annual Session.

On motion it was

Resolved, That we hereby extend our thanks to the Woman's Relief Corps and ladies of Prescott for the invitation to the fine literary entertainment of songs, recitations, etc., of last evening.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the rule requiring the selection of the Assistant Adjutant General and the Assistant Quartermaster General from the same Post as the Department Commander be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That the outgoing Department Commander be and he is hereby authorized to have the proceedings of this Encampment, the orders issued during his administration, and the usual Department and Post Rosters printed.

The Ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps extended a cordial invitation for the members and visiting Veterans to attend a banquet in this hall to-morrow, from 2:30 to 5 p. m., which was gratefully accepted.


There being no further business before the Encampment, Comrade Schwartz, the Senior Past Department Commander present, installed the newly elected Department officers.





The Commander then delivered the following address:

Comrades: The Tenth annual Encampment of this Department did me the distinguished honor of electing me as Commander. For this expression of confidence I am sincerely grateful. It certainly is a lack of interest in the work of the Grand Army, and the remedy is certainly in the hands of the comrades, by persuading members to a renewal of their obligations to fraternity, charity and loyalty. This should be our main object.

The occasion of our 31st National Encampment is one long to be remembered by those who were present. And while Arizona had a long road to travel, she had five comrades in the ranks. We had also our beautiful banner, carried by one of Toledo's cadets, and all along the line Arizona received the greatest applause. My comrades, it was good to be there. The citizens of Buffalo may well feel proud of the numbers and the way they handled such a large crowd.

Now, comrades, for the details and results of the business of the year, you are respectfully referred to the official reports that will be laid before you.

Again thanking you, comrades, for the honors conferred upon me, I am yours in F., C. and L.

COMMANDER: In compliance with our rules and regulations I herewith submit the annual report of this office.

Without reference to the details of my official duties and work, I respectfully tender the following statement:

Strength of the Department January 1, 1897, 9 Posts with 256 members in good standing; strength January 1, 1898, 8 Posts with 227 members in good standing, showing a net loss of 29 members.

J. W. Owen Post suspended during the last half year 22 members. Other Posts of the Department carry a considerable number of comrades on the rolls who pay no dues whatever, and under a strict construction of our rules could have been suspended long ago. But for the suspensions which have taken place during the year we would have about held our own. As it is, it will soon be a serious question of obtaining enough revenue to meet even the absolutely necessary expenses of the Department.

Logan Post, No. 7, has been placed on the delinquent list. As a matter of fact the Post ceased to exist in 1894, but has been kept on the rolls under the promise of being speedily reorganized. Notwithstanding the most strenuous efforts on the part of the Department this promise has not been kept. Should the Post reorganize it can be easily reinstated.

Resolved that a recess be had until 1.30 p. m., and that the afternoon session be devoted to the election of officers and other necessary business.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Encampment was called to order at 1.30 p. m.

The Committee on Addresses, Reports and Resolutions presented the following report and resolutions, which, on motion duly seconded, were unanimously adopted:

To the Department Commander and Comrades of the Eleventh Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, of Arizona:

Your committee to whom was referred all official reports, addresses and resolutions, respectfully submit the following:

We have carefully examined the Department Commander's report, and have duly considered his recommendations. We recognize the hearty good will and earnest effort which our genial Commander has exhibited during the past year as our leader, and sincerely endorse the fraternal sentiments he has expressed in his address. We urge favorable action upon the recommendations he makes in regard to memorial services, and in relation to the steadily increasing number on the suspended list.

Our Assistant Adjutant General makes an unusual exhibit of faithfulness and untiring energy in the annual report submitted by himself. We agree with the Department Commander in his commendation of the excellent work of Past Department Commander Schindler in the practical administration of the Adjutant General's office.

The report of the Assistant Quartermaster General has been audited and found to be correct.

We desire to make earnest protest against any change of control of the Soldiers' Homes from the hands of competent G. A. R. veterans to the officers of the regular army.

We desire to also protest against the admission of invalids from far distant States to the exclusion of those who reside near to such homes. At least, we believe the veteran invalid of the Pacific Coast should have preference rights to reception in the Santa Monica Home.

We cordially greet the organization of Daughters of Veterans and wish them "God Speed."

We strongly urge a better application of the National and State laws which declare that the veteran shall be preferred to office, and we deplore the evident reluctance of National and Territorial officials to comply therewith.

We recommend the adoption of the following sentiments:

Our Department Encampment recognizes the solemnity of the present national status. We are conscious that grave dangers threaten, once more, the firm establishment of the republican form of government, and that we are confronted with war. Again the so-called "Divine right" of the monarch attempts to degrade and enslave a race, and we are compelled to reassert the principles of our holy "Declaration of Independence." We faithfully pledge ourselves, under these circumstances, to support our country, our flag and our principles with our counsel, our property and our lives, if need be.

We rejoice that in our broad and thickly populated land all hearts beat as one with patriotic ardor; that though so short a time ago we were waging internecine strife, yet we are now a strongly cemented union and an indissoluble nation.

We applaud the fervid and astute patriotism displayed by that superbson of Virginia's grandest family, General Fitzhugh Lee, and are proud of the laurels which he has so gallantly won for this nation. He has displayed a noble manhood, and has firmly established the belief which we have long been pleased to entertain, that he and his former comrades have ever been actuated by the influence of principle.

We would extend thanks to the railroads of Arizona for the many privileges so generously offered to us.

We would also thank our comrades of Negley Post, and the courteous citizens of Tucson, for their kindly attention to us during this Encampment season.

cared for by their families or friends, such unfortunates not being admitted to State or National Homes.



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



The Twelfth Annual Encampment of the Department convened at the hall of J. W. Owen Post, in the city of Phoenix, at 10 a.m., Tuesday, April 18, 1899, and was called to order by Department Commander James Finley.

Comrade John Gray reported as Officer of the Day and Comrade I. M. Christy as Officer of the Guard.

The order convening the Encampment was read, and the roll of the Department officers called.

The Commander appointed Comrades John Gray, W. F. R. Schindler and Winfield Scott a Committee on Credentials.

A recess was taken until 1.30 p. m.

The Encampment was called to order at 1.30 p.m. by the Department Commander.

Comrades J. Y. T. Smith and Geo. Broughton were placed in nomination for Department Commander. Comrade Smith declined, and on motion the Acting Assistant Adjutant General was directed to cast the vote of the Encampment for Comrade George Broughton for Department Commander, which vote was announced by tellers and the candidate declared duly elected.

There being only one nomination for each of the following offices to be filled, on motion, duly seconded, the nominees were, each in his turn, unanimously elected, and so declared, namely:

Senior Vice Department Commander, Jas. D. Monihon, of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5.

Junior Vice Department Commander, P. P. Parker, of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5.

Department Chaplain, Winfield Scott, of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5.

Medical Director, C. D. Belden, of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5.

The election of delegate and alternate to the 33d National Encampment, and of members of the Department Council, was, on motion, deferred until the 19th inst.

The committee on the account of the Assistant Quartermaster General reports having found it correct, and recommends that it be altered to include the bill in favor of Comrade Snyder for \$9 for stationery, thus leaving a cash balance of \$201.66. Report accepted and committee discharged.

The following resolution was, on motion, unanimously adopted:

"Whereas the number of old soldiers is growing less and less from day to day, be it

"Resolved, That the railroad companies operating in this Territory be requested to grant one-half fare for one or more members of the Grand Army attending our Department Encampments."

There being no offer from any other Post, the invitation of Barrett Post, No. 3, of Prescott, to hold the Thirteenth Encampment at that place was unanimously accepted, and the second Tuesday in May, 1900, was fixed as the date for the convening of said Encampment.

On motion of Comrade Schindler, a Historical Department was created in the Department, and Comrade Winfield Scott elected historian, with instructions to have a paper on war subjects prepared for the next Encampment at Prescott.

The incoming administration was directed to issue a duplicate charter to Ransom Post, No. 4, at Flagstaff, in place of the one destroyed by fire.

On motion the Encampment took a recess until 9 a.m. to-morrow, April 19th.

SECOND DAY-WEDNESDAY, APRIL 19.

Encampment met at 9 a. m. Same number present as on the 18th.

Comrade J. E. Price, from Tempe, appeared, and was, on motion, admitted to a seat in the Encampment.

The minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and duly approved.

The Committee on Officers' Reports and Resolutions presented the following report, which was, on motion, duly seconded, unanimously adopted:

To the Department Commander and Comrades:

We, your committee, to whom was referred the address of the Commander, and as a Committee on Resolutions, ask leave to report:

That we listened with pleasure to the verbal report of the Commander, and recommend that the thanks of this Encampment be extended to him for the services rendered by him during the last year.

We further recommend that the thanks of this Encampment be tendered to Messrs. G. H. Vercamp & Son and E. Babbitt, of Cincinnati, Ohio, for favors conferred upon the delegates from this Department to the National Encampment, on the occasion of the holding of its meeting in that city.

We recommend that the thanks of this Encampment be extended to J. W. Owen Post, No. 5, of Phoenix, for the use of their Post hall and other favors, and also to Comrades J. Y. T. Smith and J. D. Monihon for courtesies to this Encampment.

We further recommend that the Adjutant General of the Department cause the proceedings of this Encampment to be printed, at as little cost as possible, the usual number to be sent to each Post and exchanged with other Departments.

It was moved and carried that suitable badges for Past Department Commanders be procured by the Assistant Quartermaster General, and paid for out of the funds of the Department.

Comrade Winfield Scott, of Post No. 5, was unanimously elected delegate, and

Comrade George Rogers, of Post No. 4, alternate, to the 33d National Encampment.

The following comrades were then unanimously elected members of the Department Council of Administration:

James Finley, of Negley Post, No. 1; A. L. Grow, of Burnside Post, No. 2; S. C. Rees, of Barrett Post, No. 3; George Hoxworth, of Ransom Post, No. 4; S. A. Dysart, of J. W. Owen Post, No. 5.

On motion of Comrade Grow it was unanimously resolved that all Posts in the Department which have been placed on the delinquent list shall, on making reports and paying the per capita tax due on June 30th next, be reinstated, and all delinquent dues be remitted.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment are hereby tendered to the S. P. R. R. Co. for courtesies extended.

The elected Department officers were then duly installed by the Senior Past Department Commander, Comrade A. L. Grow, and took their stations.

Department Commander Broughton appointed Comrade W. F. R. Schindler, of Barrett Post, No. 3, Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General. Comrade Schindler was duly installed by Comrade Grow.

The candidacy of Comrade Winfield Scott for National Chaplain-in-Chief- was unanimously endorsed by the Encampment.

The National and Department countersigns were then imparted to each member present.

The minutes of the Encampment were read and approved, and there being no further business to be transacted the Encampment was duly closed.
