

OF THE

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF ARIZONA.

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Thirteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at one o'clock P. M., May 8th, 1900, at the hall of Geo. H. Thomas Post No. 11, in the city of Jerome, and was called to order by Department Commander Geo. Broughton.

General Order No. 2, convening the Encampment, was read by the Assistant Adjutant General, who then called the roll of officers. Senior Vice Commander J. D. Monihon being absent on account of illness, the Commander appointed Comrade R. H. G. Minty to fill the chair pro tem.

Comrades Geo. Thompson and G. Bagnell, both of Thomas Post, having reported as Officer of the Day and Officer of the Guard respectively, the Encampment was opened in due form.

The Committee on Credentials submitted a report, showing fifty-seven Comrades entitled to seats in the Encampment, of which the following were found to be present:

Geo. Broughton, Department Commander; P. P. Parker, Junior Vice Commander; Winfield Scott, Department Chaplain; W. F. R. Schindler, Asst. Adjt. Genl. and Asst. Q. M. Genl.; S. C. Rees, Member of Council; Geo. Hoxworth, Member of Council; W. H. Ferguson, Past Post Commander, and Alexander Duff, Philip Hoover, Robert Drynan and Charles Allabach, Delegates from Barrett Post No. 3; C. A. Dudley, Delegate from Ransom Post No. 4; Thomas Prothero, Delegate from J. W. Owen Post No. 5; R. K. Farnsworth, Commander of Sedgwick Post No. 10; R. H. G. Minty, Post Commander and L. P. Nash and Jas. Barton, Delegates from Thomas Post No. 11. Total, 17.

The report was on motion, duly seconded, unanimously adopted and the Committee discharged.

Resolved on motion that all reports and resolutions be referred to a Committee of three Comrades, to be appointed by the chair. Comrades P. P. Parker, Jas. Barton and S. C. Rees were thus appointed.

The Commander delivered the following address:

ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

JEROME, May 8th, 1900.

Comrades of the G. A. R:

Placed in command of this Department one year ago by your suffrage. I now present to you my report.

During my administration, I visited every Post in this Department, and devoted from one to seven days' time to each Post except Williams, where I was taken sick and compelled to return home.

I find the boys are all growing old, and it is quite a difficult matter to get them together to Post meetings, as the majority of the members of this Department are engaged in mining or prospecting, and it is hard to get them to come into town to attend Post meetings.

I am sorry to state that, on account of sickness, I was unable to attend the Thirty-third National Encampment.

MEMORIAL DAY.

It is a day of sacred memories, set apart for one purpose only, the decoration of the graves of the loyal soldiers, sailors and marines. Over the graves of the heroes of two wars, the survivors now scatter flowers. The Grand Army should see that flags and flowers are placed over the graves of all soldiers, sailors and marines, so that the example will be firmly rooted in the ideas of the rising generation.

With the full report of the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, I think it is unnecessary for me to refer to those points, and I hereby tender my sincere thanks to Comrade W. F. R. Schindler for his able counsel and advice in running this Department, also the thorough manner in which he has conducted the offices of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General.

I would also suggest to my successor that Comrade Schindler be retained in the above-mentioned offices for the good of the Order.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL.

May 8th, 1900.

GEO. BROUGHTON,

Department Commander.

Comrade: I herewith submit my report as Assistant Adjutant General for the past year.

On April 18th, 1899, there were in good standing in the Department seven Posts, with a membership of 198. Two Posts were reported delinquent. They have since been reinstated. Logan Post No. 7 has been reorganized and Geo. H. Thomas Post No. 11 has been mustered in at Jerome. On December 31st last the Department had 10 Posts with 187 members in good standing.

The principal loss in membership has been by suspension, a state of affiairs grown to be chronic and commented on in every report for the last eight years. In my opinion it will be absolutely necessary to hold at least one open or social meeting during each month in each Post in order to interest the Comrades and

induce them to enter and stay with the Posts. Otherwise it will be but a short time before this Department will cease to exist.

The amount expended for relief is small apparently, but I am convinced that only a fraction has been reported, the Comrades, as I know, preferring to give and say nothing about it. The Posts collect hardly funds enough to meet running expenses.

There were eleven deaths reported during the year. The mortuary report attached hereto gives the names and service.

W. F. R. SCHINDLER, Assistant Quartermaster General. The Junior Vice Commander reported that, by order of the Dept. Commander, he had during the year, in conjunction with the Senior Vice Commander and other comrades of J. W. Owen Post of Phoenix, reorganized Logan Post No. 7, in Tempe, of which due report had been made at the time.

Recess of thirty minutes was had.

Encampment called to order at 2 P. M.

The Committee on Reports and Resolutions submitted the following report, which was on motion accepted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

JEROME, May 8th, 1900.

Department Commander and Comrades: Your Committee, to whom was submitted the Report of Department Commander, Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, beg leave to report that they have examined the several reports. That they find the Assistant Adjutant General's and the Assistant Quartermaster General's reports in excellent order, the accounts well and accurately kept, and believe that very careful and painstaking work has been done by the present efficient officer.

We heartily endorse the action of the Department Commander in his tireless duty of visiting all the Posts in this Department, in trying to build up the weak Posts and collect the old soldiers and form new Posts where it was possible to do so.

Your Committee would like to submit the last recommendation of Department Commander's report to the members of this Encampment as to the advisability of consolidating the office of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, and would like a full discussion of this subject by the members of this Encampment.

After discussion, it was found to be the sense of the Encampment, that the consolidation of the offices of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General was in the interest of economy, and that the matter was by the rules left to the discretion of the Department Commander.

The address of the Department Commander and the reports of the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General were then unanimously adopted.

On motion it was unanimously resolved that the Fourteenth Annual Encampment of the Department be held on the third Wednesday in June, 1901, at Williams.

The Committee on Reports and Resolutions reported the following resolution, submitted by Comrade Minty, which was on motion unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS: Comrade Thomas Burke, a member of George H. Thomas Post No. 11 of this Department, made application for pension under the provisions of the law of 1890; said application hung fire for years, but finally, pension was granted at the minimum rate of \$6 per month, at which rate the accrued back pension was paid; and

WHEREAS, without application for increase having been made by the pensioner, and without any additional evidence having been furnished, an increase of \$2 per month was allowed from date of payment of said accrued pension; and

WHEREAS, Comrade Franklin D. Smith, also a member of George H. Thomas Post No. 11 of this Department, received from the pension bureau a notice of receipt and filing of his application for pension on August 12, 1890, but when pension at rate of \$6 per month was granted, it dated from January 26. 1893. Now therefore

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Encampment, that if the evidence in the case of Comrade Burke was sufficient to entitle him to a pension of \$8 per month, from date of payment or allowance of accrued pension, it was sufficient to entitle him to the rate of \$8 from date of original allowance.

Resolved, That as the law provides, when pension is allowed, it shall date from filing of claim or application, it is the sense of this Encampment, that in the case of Comrade Smith he is entitled to pension from August 12, 1890.

Resolved, That in both these cases, the comrades have by the above recited action of the Commissioner of Pensions, in withholding that which the law gives them, been defrauded of their vested rights.

Resolved, That the custom of the Pension Bureau in rating pensions when granted, carrying arrearages at the lowest or minimum amount, regardless of the degree of disability of the pensioner, is contrary to the letter and spirit of the law; and is actuated mean and petty spirit of false economy, deserving the condemnation of all men.

Resolved, That in the rule of the Pension Bureau, refusing to take up or recognize an application for increase of pension until one year after date of medical examination, there is perpetrated a great wrong, hardship and injury to deserving and needy comrades.

Resolved, That the large number of comrades scattered throughout the mountain States and Territories, who, in their young manhood freely gave their lives to our country, and who are now living, or rather existing, in poverty and want; and whose proper and legal claims for pensions have been dragging their weary course for lo, these many years, in consequence of the Pension Bureau's requirement of impossible evidence, is a lasting disgrace to our country.

Resolved, That we consider the pension list a Roll of Honor; we are unalterably opposed to the placing of improper or unworthy names thereon; and we hereby pledge ourselves to use our best efforts to prevent frauds on the pension system. At the same time we insist on a proper interpretation and execution of the liberal pension laws of our country.

Resolved. That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded by the Asst. Adjt. General to the National Tribune with a request to publish same, and also to Hon. J. F. Wilson, Delegate to Congress from this Territory, with the request that he present it to the Commissioner of Pensions.

The Encampment then proceeded to the election of officers for the ensuing year.

For Department Commander: Comrade Geo. Broughton of Post No. 3, Comrades R. H. G. Minty of Post No. 11 and P. P. Parker of Post No. 5, were placed in nomination and duly seconded.

The Commander appointed Comrades Scott and Ferguson as tellers and a ballot was had. Comrade

R. H. G. Minty having received the highest number of votes, the election was on motion of Comrade P. P. Parker made unanimous, and the Chair declared Comrade Minty duly elected.

For Senior Vice Commander: Comrade P. P. Parker was nominated and the nomination closed. The Assistant Adjutant General was instructed to cast the ballot of the Encampment for the nominee, which was done, whereupon the Comrade was declared duly elected.

For Junior Vice Commander: Comrade Philip Hoover was nominated. Nominations closed and the Assistant Adjutant General instructed to cast the ballot of the Encampment for the nominee. Ballot so cast and the Comrade declared duly elected.

On motion, Comrade Winfield Scott was elected Department Chaplain by acclamation.

For Medical Director, Comrade Geo. D. Kendall was nominated.

For Members of Council: Comrades A. B. Sampson of Post No. 1, L. L. Burns of Post No. 4, I. M. Christy of Post No. 5, B. F. Pascoe of Post No. 6 and R. K. Farnsworth of Post No. 10.

For Delegate to the Thirty-fourth National Encampment: Alexander Duff of Post No. 3.

For Alternate: Wm. H. Ferguson of Post No. 3. Nominations closed.

There being only one nomination for each of the offices to be filled, the Assistant Adjutant General was instructed to successively cast the ballot of the Encampment for each of the foregoing nominees. Ballots so cast, and the nominee after the cast of each ballot declared duly elected.

The Assistant Adjutant General was instructed to have the proceedings of the Encampment and the Department Roster and Roster of the Posts printed as usual.

The Committees on Resolutions reported the following resolution, which was, on motion, unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment be extended to the several railroads and to the press of this Territory for kind treatment, and for courtesies extended to its members. Also to Geo. H. Thomas Post for the use of their hall and to its members for the courtesies extended to us at this the Thirteenth Encampment of this Department. Also to the Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant General for untiring zeal and fidelity with which they have performed their several duties.

The Commander announced that the newly elected officers would be publicly installed at the campfire tendered by Thomas Post, at about 8 P. M. tonight.

There being no further business, the Encampment closed at 5:45 P. M.

A very enjoyable campfire was had in the evening. The officers elect were installed by Past Department Commander W. F. R. Schindler.

The Committee of the Encampment on Reports and Resolutions, submitted the following resolution, which was by the visiting members unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the visiting members of the Encampment extend to the members of Geo. H. Thomas Post, G. A. R., and to the ladies and citizens of Jerome their most hearty thanks for their kindness and the many courtesies extended during our stay in their beautifully romantic city.





PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

FOURTEENTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF ARIZONA,

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Fourteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at the hall of Sedgwick Post No. 10, in Williams, at 2 o'clock p. m., Wednesday, June 19th, 1901, in compliance with a resolution passed at the Thirteenth Annual Encampment, and by virtue of General Orders No. 5, present series. Department Commander R. H. G. Minty presided.

Hon. E. Ashurst delivered an eloquent address of welcome on behalf of the citizens of Williams, to which Comrade A. J. Doran made a fitting reply.

The general public having withdrawn, the Encampment was opened in due form by the Department Commander.

Comrade J. Smith acted as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Andrew Drake as Officer of the Guard. Comrade Henry, of Flagstaff, invoked the divine blessing. The Assistant Adjutant General then called the roll of officers. The Junior Vice Commander

and the Chaplain being absent, the Commander appointed Comrade Geo. Hoxworth Junior Vice Commander, and Comrade Henry Chaplain pro tem.

The Committee on Credentials submitted a report, showing eighty-two Comrades entitled to a seat in the Encampment, of which the following were found to be present:

R. H. G. Minty, Department Commander and Commander of Negley Post No. 1; P. P. Parker, Senior Vice Commander and Past Post Commander of J. W. Owens Post No. 5; W. F. R. Schindler, Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, and Past Department and Post Commander; L. L. Burns, Member of Council and Past Post Commander of Ransom Post No. 4; R. K. Farnsworth, Member of Council and Commander of Sedgwick Post No. 10; Geo. W. Sanders, Past Post Commander, and A. J. Doran, Delegate of Negley Post No. 1; George Augustine, Commander, S. C. Rees, Past Post Commander, and Robert Drynan and George Zika, Delegates of Barrett Post No. 3; George Hoxworth, Past Department and Past Post Commander, J. B. Smith, Past Post Commander, W. H. Pierce, Past Post Commander, and James Haley and Joseph R. Lockett, Delegates of Ransom Post No. 4; Andrew Drake, Delegate of Sedgwick Post No. 10. Total, 17.

The report was, on motion, unanimously adopted and the committee discharged.

On motion, the Commander appointed Comrades Sanders, Rees and Pierce as a Committee on Reports and Resolutions.

The Commander then delivered the following address:

ADDRESS OF DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

Comrades of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic:

At our last Encampment you honored me by electing me your Department Commander, and now at this, the Fourteenth Encampment, in rendering an account of my stewardship, I regret that I must report that I have fallen far short of what I had hoped to accomplish.

As you are all aware, I succeeded in organizing at Jerome a good, live, promising Post, George H. Thomas No. 11. In August of last year, business interests made necessary my removal to Tucson, and about the same time twelve members of the Post found it necessary to leave Jerome to find employment. As this would leave only three Comrades who could attend Post meetings, it was decided that the charter be surrendered, and George H. Thomas Post, after a life of about fourteen months, ceased to exist.

At Tucson, I found Negley Post No. 1 practically dead. There had been no election for two years, and no meeting of the Post for I don't know how long. Comrade Sampson was the hold-over Commander, and he, with two or three other earnest Comrades, were doing all in their power to prevent the dissolution of the Post. When I joined it by transfer, they worked faithfully with me in placing it on its feet once more. It now numbers forty-seven members in good standing, and on last Memorial Day there was a good turn-out and a very satisfactory celebration of our beautiful memorial service. The prospects for the future of Negley Post are most flattering.

I desired and had purposed spending a couple of weeks at Safford and Bisbee, at both of which places, I believe, there are a sufficient number of Comrades resident to warrant the organization of Posts, but it has been impossible for me to do so.

Comrades, I regret to have to call your attention to the fact that the present condition of our association in the Department of Arizona is caused entirely by our own apathy. We apparently fail to appreciate the fact that, as our numbers grow fewer and our ranks thinner year by year, it becomes more and more our bounden duty to stand together and to support each other.

There are in this small Department hundreds of men wearing "the little brown button," who have not affiliated with any Post, and there are scores of others, who are nominally members of Posts, who do not attend meetings or take any interest in our noble association. Do these men ever give thought to the sacred

obligation taken at the time of their muster-in—an obligation taken "in the presence of Almighty God"?

There are also in every community in this Department old soldiers, members of the Grand Army of the Republic of 1861-5, who have not yet joined our ranks. Comrades, is it not our duty to bring these men into our association?

At the close of the Civil War, the people of the United States were bubbling over with gratitude for the great work that we had performed. Nothing was too good for the men who had so freely placed their lives on the altar of patriotism. But how is it today? The fact that we, the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, are the men who placed our country in its present glorious position, is forgotten; officials and politicians give us the cold shoulder and try to push us aside. As an illustration and instance of this, look at the action of the Governor of Arizona on the occasion of the visit of our President to the city of Phoenix in the early part of the month of May.

It was reported to me that in making arrangements for the reception of the President, the Grand Army of the Republic received no consideration whatever. I thereupon wrote to the Governor, remonstrating against the apparent neglect. The Governor answered that he did not appoint the Reception Committee and was not a member of any committee, but acknowledged that he named twenty-five citizens who, in conjunction with a committee of fifteen appointed by the Mayor, selected a Reception and other committees; that when the oversight complained of was discovered, the Commander of the G. A. R. Post at Phoenix was appointed on the Reception Committee.

The facts in the case, as I understand them, are: After the appointment of the sub, or active, committees, a member of the Owen Post Committee met a member of the Executive Committee and said to him that, regardless of what arrangements might be made by the Executive or Reception Committees, the members of the G. A. R. would be at the train and would receive the President. This is what caused the appointment of the Commander of Owen Post on the General Committee, which then had nothing to do.

I am reliably informed that, on the arrival of the Presidential train, the Grand Army of the Republic, about 100 strong, was in waiting to receive the President; that, when the chairman of our committee attempted to get on the President's car, the Governor of Arizona stood on the lower step and said to him, "You cannot get on this car." The chairman insisted and spoke loudly. The President, hearing this, came out on the platform of the car, and

then, and not until then, did Governor Murphy step aside, and the chairman, mounting the platform, delivered his reception address, and our Comrades were cordially received by our great President.

Comrades, I have entered into this incident for the reason that I believe it will tend to make us all appreciate the absolute necessity for the old soldiers, the men of 1861-5, the men who so glad and cheerfully gave the best years of their young manhood to their country in its hour of dire need, now in their old age to stand shoulder to shoulder as they did forty years ago. Remember that every man of us has his vote, and that vote should be cast as were our bullets—straight at the enemy.

My dear old Comrades, every man of us has more or less influence with his fellows, his friends and neighbors, and we ought to use that influence for their good. Will you allow me to impress upon you that it is our duty, and it should be our pleasure, to use every effort to bring into the fold of the Grand Army of the Republic of today every man who was a member of the Grand Army of the Republic during the stormy days that tried men's souls, the days of 1861-5? "United we stand, divided we fall."

Comrades, I invite your careful attention to the reports of the Assistant Adjutant General and the Assistant Quartermaster General, Comrade W. F. R. Schindler, whom I commend to you as a true and enthusiastic Comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic, and I take this opportunity to extend to him my sincere thanks for the unvarying and cordial support which he has given me during my term of office as Department Commander.

All of which is respectfully submitted in Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

The address was, on motion, referred to the Committee on Reports and Resolutions.

The Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General read his reports, as follows:

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL.

R. H. G. Minty, Department Commander:

COMRADE: In compliance with regulations, I have the honor to herewith submit my report as Assistant Adjutant General for the past year.

On December 31st, 1899, there were in good standing in the Department ten Posts with 187 members, whilst on December 31st last there were reported nine Posts with 211 members in good standing, a net gain of twenty-four members, notwithstanding the surrender of its charter by Geo. H. Thomas Post No. 11, of Jerome, which had eighteen members. There were five deaths during the year. Names and service are given in the mortuary report, attached hereto.

I renew my recommendation of last year, that Posts hold a social meeting each month, assisted or managed by a Woman's Relief Corps, if possible, so as to interest the Comrades and to induce those who are not now members of Posts to affiliate with them.

The amount reported expended for relief is insignificant. In my opinion this is caused by the lack of Post funds. To my personal knowledge the Comrades, individually, are charitable to a fault.

The appeal, made by the Department Commander in General Orders No. 2, to assist the Comrades who suffered by the Galveston disaster, has been without result, owing. I suppose, to the fact that the Comrades had already contributed to the funds collected by various Citizens' Subscription Committees.

I find that the graves of Comrades of several Posts in the Department are without the headstones which the National Government supplies free of cost. I drew attention to the fact when I had the honor to be Commander of this Department, and furnished the Posts the necessary blank applications. I would recommend that blanks be again sent to the Posts, with the urgent request that they be at once filled out and forwarded to the Quartermaster General of the United States Army at Washington.

Five general and one special orders have been issued during the year, and all national orders, blanks, etc., have been promptly distributed.

To you, Commander, and to the Officers and Comrades of the Department I desire to return my heartfelt thanks for the uniform courtesies shown me. The duties performed have been a pleasure to me.

Resolved, That the Commander appoint a committee of three Comrades to draft an obituary of deceased Comrades.

The Commander appointed as such committee Comrades Doran, Hoxworth and Augustine.

Comrade Sanders offered the following resolution, which was immediately unanimously adopted without being referred to the Committee on Resolutions: WHEREAS, Several Comrades who have served their full terms as Post Commanders in this Department, have in various ways severed their connection with the Grand Army of the Republic and have thereby lost all honors as Past Post Commanders; therefore, be it

GENERAL ORDERS No. 3.

I. One of the greatest and grandest works being advocated

by our association, the Grand Army of the Republic, is the introduction and perfection of a system of military instruction and patriotic education in our public schools. Steady and untiring work to this end has been going on for years. The Department Commander is pleased to be able to announce to the Comrades that our efforts are at last beginning to bear fruit; and for their information the following Act, passed at the last session of Congress, and approved by the President on the 26th day of February, 1901, is published:

AN ACT

To Amend Section Twelve Hundred and Twenty-five of Revised Statutes so as to Provide for Detail of Retired Officers of the Army and Navy to Assist in Military Instruction in Schools.

Whereas the national defense must depend upon the volunteer service of the people of the States; and

Whereas those schools which shall adopt a system of military instruction are entitled to the assistance of the Government, in order to secure to the United States such a knowledge of military affairs among the youth of the country as will render them efficient as volunteers if called upon for the national defense; therefore,

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled,

That Section Twelve Hundred and Twenty-five of the Revised Statutes, concerning the detail of officers of the Army and Navy to educational institutions, be, and the same is hereby, amended so as to permit the President to detail, under the provisions of that Act, and in addition to the detail of the officers of the Army and Navy now authorized to be detailed under the existing provisions of said Act, such retired officers of the Army and Navy of the United States as, in his judgment, may be required for that purpose, to act as instructors in military drill and tactics in schools in the United States, where such instruction shall have been authorized by the educational authorities thereof, and where the services of such instructors shall have been applied for by said authorities.

SEC. 2. That no detail shall be made under this Act to any school unless it shall pay the cost of commutation of quarters of the retired officers detailed thereto, and the extra-duty pay to which the latter may be entitled by law to receive for the performance of special duty; provided, that no detail shall be made under the provisions of this Act unless the officers to be detailed are willing to accept such position without compensation from the Government other than their retired pay.

SEC. 3. That the Secretary of War is authorized to issue, at his discretion. and under proper regulations to be prescribed by him, out of ordnance and ordnance stores belonging to the Government and which can be spared for that purpose, upon the approval of the governors of the respective States, such number of the same as may be required for military instruction and practice by such school, and the Secretary shall require a bond in each case for double the value of the property, for the care and safe-keeping thereof and for the return of the same when required.

SEC. 4. That this Act shall take effect immediately.



OF THE

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF ARIZONA GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The Fifteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic, convened at the hall of Negley Post No. 1, in Tucson, at 10 a.m., on Wednesday, June 18th, 1902, in compliance with resolutions passed at the Fourteenth Annual Encampment, and General Orders No. 3. The Department Commander presided and opened the Encampment in due form.

The roll of officers was called. The Junior Vice Commander and Chaplain being absent, the Commander appointed Comrade Schumacher, of Negley Post, Junior Vice Commander pro tem., and Comrade Ross, of the same post, Chaplain pro tem.

In the absence of Comrade A. B. Sampson, a member of the Committee on Credentials, Comrade Douglass Snyder was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Comrade Angus, of Negley Post, acted as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Fulmer, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard.

The Committee on Credentials submitted its report, showing seventy Comrades to be entitled to a seat in the Encampment, of which the following were found to be present:

P. P. Parker, Department Commander and Past Commander of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; Geo. W. Sanders, Senior Vice Commander and Past Commander of Negley Post No. 1; W. F. R. Schindler, Past Department Commander, Past Commander of J. W. Owen Post No. 5, and Assistant Aujutant and Quartermaster General of the Department; R. H. G. Minty, Past Department Commander, Member of Council and Commander of Negley Post No. 1; James A. Zabriskie, Department Judge Advocate and Past Commander of Negley Post No. 1; Douglass Snyder, Past Department Commander and Past Commander of Negley Post No. 1; Chas. D. Belden, Past Department Commander and Past Commander of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; C. F. Schumacher and George Angus, delegates, and W. I. Ross and W. C. Dunn, alternates from Negley Post No. 1; J. Schneider, R. Frazer, N. S. Fulmer and R. B. Kelley, Past Commanders of Negley Post No. 1. Total, 15.

The report was on motion received, adopted and the committee discharged.

The Commander appointed the following Committee on Reports and Resolutions: Comrades Belden, Minty and Snyder.

The following address was then delivered by the Commander:

ADDRESS OF THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.

COMRADES: The Fourteenth Annual Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic for the Department of Arizona gave me the honor of presiding over the deliberations of this

body as well as to have a watchful care over the various. Posts scattered among the hills and valleys of our beloved Arizona.

It was with becoming pride that I accepted the distinguished honor, and yet with timidity and fear lest I should fail to accomplish all that might be expected of the Department Commander, realizing, as we all do, that, like no other organization in existence, our source of supply will soon cease. Recruits are few, and only coming from those who, from one cause or another, have heretofore failed to be mustered in with us.

Year by year the number lessens—our ranks are thinned—and rapidly they cross the river to increase the roll on the other side, so that only a few more gatherings like this will be held—until the last one of our comrades will stand alone awaiting the final tattoo.

Comrades, I extend to you a cordial greeting; may our ranks remain unbroken as long as we have strength to be useful and our presence not a burden to those around us.

The year just passed has not been unlike others gone before; and while we have lost some by the hand of time, we have gained some by muster in, so that the membership in this Department has lost somewhat in the last year.

But few general orders have been issued, with but one of more than local importance. On September 16th General Order No. 2 was sent out to the Grand Army Posts of this Department, announcing the death of our much beloved President—Comrade William McKinley. In sad recognition of the great loss to our organization, I ordered that the colors of the Posts of this Department be draped in mourning and suitable action be taken in the form of resolutions, and have them spread upon their minutes. And now, as a further mark of respect to our martyred President, I recommend that a memorial page in our proceedings be set apart, dedicated to his memory, closing with his last words, "It is God's way; His will be done."

It has been my misfortune not to be able to visit the various Posts during this year. Reports but from one Post show any friction in the ranks; that comes from Alexander No. 6, at Globe. The differences there, I think, should be easily and amicably settled by their own members, unless it is their wish to submit the questions of difference to this meeting of the Department for action.

I desire to thank Ransom Post No. 4, at Flagstaff, for their kind invitation to be present at the dedication of their new hall, early last winter, as well as to address them at their last memorial service. Both invitations, to my great regret, I was forced to decline on account of important engagements that I had on hand at both dates.

I desire now to thank the Woman's Relief Corps of this Territory, who have so nobly aided the Grand Army Posts in caring for the old soldiers who have been unfortunate in life's struggle. Also the members of the various Posts.

I most heartily wish to extend my thanks to Past Department Commander Schindler, our efficient Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, for his unceasing and constant assistance during the year, as well as to Past Department Commander Belden and our Senior Vice Department Commander Sanders, for help and encouragement at all times.

And now, my Comrades, I return to you the gavel of authority, believing that you will forgive the errors and mistakes of your Commander, and trusting that the work of our noble order in future years may be as grand and heroic as was the service which made us eligible to its membership.

The Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General read the following reports:

P. P. Parker, Department Commander:

COMRADE: In accordance with our regulations, I have the honor to herewith submit my report for the past year:

The number of Posts in the Department on December 31st, 1900, was 9, with 211 members in good standing. The report of December 31st, 1901, shows 8 Posts with 187 members in good standing. Burnside Post No. 2 has surrendered its charter, and a number of comrades have been suspended for non-payment of dues. It is a lamentable fact that payment of dues has been neglected and in some cases refused by comrades who are financially well able to make payment. The suspensions cover almost invariably such cases. The following table gives the standing of each Post for 1900 and 1901:

The mortuary report shows nine deaths between June, 1901, and today, of which five have occurred since January 1st.

Only Negley and Ransom Posts have reported disbursments for relief.

Some of the smaller Posts show very little or no signs of life. The administration has thought it best to carry them along, and has urged them to keep up their organizations, in the hope that they will recuperate. If a Woman's Relief Corps and a camp of the Sons of Veterans could be established in connection with each Post, they would soon be vigorous and strong.

Blank requisitions for headstones for the graves of deceased comrades have again been sent to each Post, and it is hoped that on next Memorial Day there will be no grave without a Government headstone.

From the exhibit of receipt and expenditures, hereto attached, it appears that there is a balance of \$250.00 on hand, which sum is deposited in the Valley Bank of Phoenix, a custom which has been followed for the last four years.

The inventory of supplies on hand, shows their value to be \$35.50.

I desire to express my thanks to you, Commander, for the honor conferred on me, by selecting me as your Assistant Adjujutant and Quartermaster General, and trust that I have performed my duties to the satisfaction of yourself and the comrades of the Department. I also sincerely thank the officers and the comrades of the Department for the uniform courtesy shown me.

It has been a pleasure to serve with you.

Detailed account and vouchers examined by Council of Administration and found correct.

W. F. R. Schindler, Assistant Quartermaster General. The report of the Department Inspector, for the term ending June 30th, 1901, which was very incomplete, from the fact that several Posts had failed to send in their reports, has been completed as far as possible by the Assistant Adjutant General (the Inspector having gone out with his Post, No. 2), and forwarded to the Inspector General.

The following is a synopsis of the report:

No. of Posts June 30, 1901, 9; members in good standing, 209; attendance at Post meetings, irregular; no relief fund in Posts; expenditures for relief, \$5.60; funds in hands of Post Quartermasters, \$258.61; value of other property, \$540.00; Posts with Relief Corps, 3; no camps of Sons of Veterans.

On motion, the address of the Department Commander and the reports of the other officers were referred to the Committee on Reports and Resolutions.

The Council of Administration reported that it had carefully examined the accounts and vouchers of the Assistant Quartermaster General, and found them correct, and the disbursements lawfully made.

An appeal by Comrade Chas. Schulze, of Col. Alexander Post No. 6, from a decision of the Department Commander as to the legality of the suspension of certain members of that Post, and other matters, was on motion referred to the Committee on Reports and Resolutions.

The Assistant Adjutant General reported that the painting of the State flower and repairs on the Department banner, ordered by the last Encampment, would be attended to by Mrs. Francis, who painted the original banner.

The Commander of Negley Post invited the members of the Encampment to a banquet, to be given by the Post at 8 p. m., on June 19th.

Resolved, That the election of officers for the ensuing year take place at 11:30 a.m., on June 19th.

On motion of Comrade Minty, seconded, an adjournment was had until 10 a.m., June 19th.

The Encampment met pursuant to adjournment, at 10 a.m., and was duly opened by the Department Commander.

The Committee on Officers Reports reported as follows:

We, your Committee to whom was referred the Department Commander's address, and the annual reports of the Assistant Adjutant General, Assistant Quartermaster General and the Medical Director, respectfully submit the following report:

We have carefully considered the address of Department Commander P. P. Parker, and find it to be a document inspired by the loftiest sentiments of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty, the great characteristics of comradeship.

We fully appreciate the fact that our numbers are rapidly dwindling, and that the local conditions of our Department are such that little can be done towards bringing the stray sheep into the flock, except by the earnest work of the individual Posts.

In considering the reports of the Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, we are impressed with the thorough manner in which the work of those departments has been conducted. The funds of the Department have been handled and administered in a conservative and business-like manner, the result showing an increase in balance cash on hand, with all liabilities paid.

We have examined the reports of the various Posts, as embodied in the report of the Assistant Adjutant General, and find them to be correct.

We heartily approve the recommendation of Department Commander Parker that a memorial page be set apart in honor of our late Comrade, Wm. McKinley, President of the United States.

In addition to the national calamity in the death of our martyr President, Comrade William McKinley, we regret the large number of deaths that have occurred in our small Department during the past year. Nine deaths of comrades have been reported, being in the ratio of about 45 to the thousand, being a

much larger percentage than usually reported in National Encampments.

In the appeal of Comrade Schulze, Surgeon and late Quartermaster of Alexander Post No. 6, against the ruling of Department Commander P. P. Parker, in the matter of the suspension of certain members, and of a complaint against Post Commander Dunham of same Post, which was referred to your committee, we find that there appears to be considerable discord amongst the members of Alexander Post. Many allegations are made, but no evidence in their support has been submitted. It is therefore impossible, with the papers before us, to come to any conclusion or express an opinion on the merits of the case.

We respectfully recommend that the whole matter be referred to a committee of one or more, for investigation, report and recommendation to the incoming Department Commander and Council of Administration. We respectfully suggest that the appointment of this committee be left to the incoming Department Commander, but that no member of such committee be a member of Alexander Post.

The Committee also reported the following resolutions, which were, as well as the report, accepted and unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, There has been a great deal of discussion concerning pension legislation, wherein the association of the Grand Army of the Republic has been accused of raiding the national treasury, which they protected with their life's blood in the days of our country's peril, therefore, it is

Resolved, It is the sense of this Encampment that no body of men in these United States is more conservative in its desire to protect the treasury of our country from improper or illegal pensions than is the Grand Army of the Republic.

Resolved, That our association considers the pension laws of our country not only just, but liberal.

Resolved, That the Grand Army of the Republic simply asks for a proper administration of the laws as they now exist.

Resolved, That we heartily endorse and commend the action of the National Encampment on the pension question.

Resolved, That we sincerely trust that the new Commissioner will appreciate that it is his duty not only to protect the treasury from unjust claims for pensions, but that it is also his duty to see to it that every claimant who is entitled to a pension has it granted. It is also

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment be tendered to the various railroads and the press of the territory for courtesies granted and received.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment be extended to our Comrades of Negley Post for their cordial welcome and their continued and pleasant attention to the comrades during their stay in the city of Tucson.

The resolution which provided for the election of officers at 11:30 a.m. today, was, on motion, reconsidered, and the time set for 10:45 a.m. That hour having arrived, the Commander declared the nomination and election of officers for the ensuing term to be in order, and called for the nomination of candidates for Department Commander.

Comrade Belden nominated Comrade Geo. W. Sanders, pointing out that Comrade Sanders was one of the oldest members of Negley Post, who had always by word and deed worked for the welfare of the Post, and who in the past year as Senior Vice Department Commander had represented this Department at the National Encampment, held at Cleveland. He asserted that the promotion to Department Commander was due to Comrade Sanders, and that the Encampment in so honoring him would make no mistake

The nomination was seconded by Comrades Fulmer and Schindler

Comrade Douglass Snyder, of Negley Post, nominated Comrade C. F. Schumacher, the present Senior Vice Commander of that Post, Mayor of Tucson, and a sterling man.

The nomination was seconded by Comrade Kelley.

On motion, duly seconded, the nominations were closed.

The Department Commander appointed Comrades Minty and Fulmer as tellers.

The following members of the encampment were found to be present: Department Commander Parker, Senior Vice Department Commander Geo. W. Sanders, Past Department Commanders Minty. Douglass Snyder, Charles. D. Belden, W. F. R. Schindler; Past Post Commanders of Negley Post J. Schneider, R. Frazer, N. S. Fulmer, R. B. Kelley; Delegates C. F. Schumacher and Geo. Angus, and Alternates W. J. Ross and W. C. Dunn, of Negley Post. Total, 14. Negley Post being entitled to and having elected five delegates and five alternates, of which only four were present, the Encampment, on motion of Comrade Minty, seated Comrade S. R. DeLong of that Post, who happened to be present, as the fifth delegate of the Post.

A ballot was then had, the comrades depositing their votes as their names were called by the Assistant Adjutant General. Comrade Schumacher refrained from voting.

14 votes were found to have been cast, of which Comrade Sanders received 7, and Comrade Schumacher 7, resulting in a tie.

A recess for ten minutes was ordered.

When the Encampment reconvened, a second ballot was had, resulting in 14 votes being cast, of which Comrade Sanders received 5, and Comrade Schumacher 9. On motion of Comrade Sanders the election was made unanimous. The Department Commander declared Comrade Schumacher elected Department Commander for the ensuing term.

There being but one nominee for each of the remaining offices to be filled, the Assistant Adjutant General was successively and in each case, on motion, duly seconded, instructed to cast the

vote of the Encampment for such nominee, and the following comrades were after each ballot cast declared duly elected: Senior Vice Commander Comrade I. M. Christy, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; Junior Vice Commander, Jas. A. Zabriskie, of Negley Post No. 1; Department Chaplain, Winfield Scott, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; Medical Director, Geo. D. Kendall, of Barrett Post No. 3; Delegate to 36th National Encampment, Geo. W. Sanders, of Negley Post No. 1; Council of Administration, R. H. G. Minty, of Negley Post No. 1; Samuel Goldsworthy, of Barrett Post No. 3; Geo. Hoxworth, of Ransom Post No. 4; R. H. Greene, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; D. F. Phelan, of Sedgwick Post No. 10.

The selection of alternate to the 36th National Encampment was, on motion, left to the Council of Administration, such selection to be made before September 1st next.

There being no offer from any other Post, Phoenix was, on motion of Comrade Belden, selected as the place, and the third Wednesday in April, 1903, as the time of holding the 16th Annual Encampment of this Department.

The present ratio of Department per capita tax (60 cents per year for each member in good standing) was continued for the next year.

The Assistant Adjutant General was instructed to have 200 copies of the Journal of this Encampment, together with the roster of the Department and the Posts, printed.

Resolved, That the officers-elect who are not present, be installed by a Past Department or Post Commander of their respective Post, and that due report be made to the Assistant Adjutant General.

Past Department Commander Chas. D. Belden duly installed the officers-elect who were present.

Department Commander Schumacher announced as his Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, Comrade W. F. R. Schindler, who was then installed.

After a few appropriate remarks by the retiring as well as the newly installed Department Commander, the Encampment closed at 1 p. m.

W. F. R. Schindler, Assistant Adjutant General.

At 8 p. m. Negley Post gave an elaborate banquet, at which were present, besides the members of the Post, the visiting comrades, members of the Camp of Sons of Veterans of Tucson, and invited guests. 

Our Fallen Heroes, in silence. Sentiment by Toastmaster.

The fraternal re-union of old soldiers who have bared their bosoms to the storm, has ever been a scene of joyful reminiscence. The annual meetings of the G. A. R. have grown into national importance and have become interwoven with the warp and woof of our national existence. On this 15th annual encampment of the department of Arizona we meet again in fraternity, charity and loyalty, and rejoice in the opportunity thus afforded of renewing our pledges of fidelity around the altar of our common country.

I give you a toast,

"Our Guests,"

And call upon General Minty to respond.

Friends and comrades, who are our guests on this occasion, it is my very pleasing duly, as commander of Negley Post, and on the call of our toast master, to bid you welcome.

We not only bid you gentlemen of the faculty of the University of Arizona a hearty welcome, but we assure you that we are pleased and proud to have you with us at this time. We have invited all of our old friends, "the enemy," of whom we had any knowledge, and we sincerely regret that there is but one present. During the war, we learned to admire and respect for their gallantry, the men who so stubbornly fought us for four long years; the men whose hands we grasp today. while proudly greet them as fellow American soldiers, who claim, with us, one country and one flag. No one can be more welcome than the gallant men who faced us on the field of battle.

To our young comrades, the Sons of Veterans, we also extend a hearty and cordial welcome. What can I say to you, our visiting comrades of the Grand Army? The men who fought and suffered and bled together as we have are blood relations, as Comrade Belden so aptly expressed it, this morning, you can understand and appreciate the whole souled heartiness of our welcome to all here.

Our association, the Grand Army of the Republic, is one in which every union soldier of the civil war naturally takes much pride. But. comrades, we must remember that it is only a reflex or representative association. The letters G. A. R. and this badge which we all love, represent something far greater than the Grand Army of the Republic of today: they represent and keep alive the memories of the Grand Army of Republic of 1861-5. They recall to our memories the days of our young manhood when in the hour of our country's peril, we abandoned profitable business pursuits or lucrative employment and nurried forward to the field of battle in response to the call of our great president, singing as "We are coming, we marched. Father Abraham, three hundred thousand more." More men lost their lives in defense of the union than the allied nations of Europe were able to muster in the field in any of their monster combinations against Napoleon. And how many have, since the war, met with premature death from disabilities contracted during that war, God only knows.

We can and do look with pride on the standing and position of our country among the nations of the earth; and with truth and justice we can say, "It is our work that made can look with this possible." We equanimity upon the ranting and railing of such demagogues as Patterson of Colorado, Carmack of Tennessee and Rawlins of Utah, who misrepresent their constituents in the halls of congress, for we know that the good

Major Ross responded as follows:

The army at present is being abused by its enemies, and is ably defended by its friends, but triends and enemies, forget, if they ever have known, that the army has never brought on a war, although they are depended upon to "see through" the wars that civilians foment. It was General Sherman who said years ago to a body of clergymen: "You gentlemen in black coats are the men who make war. We of he army simply end the wars which you bring on." And this is as true today as when General Sherman said it.

While the professional military training is everywhere founded on a cortain spirit of caste, and army offimers have been accused of embodying an aristocratic and class spirit, yet this much can be said to the contrary. Although militarism is not consistent in theory with the spirit

the world has more of the democratic spirit prevailing in it than our own And it may be hoped that the time will never come when this cannot be said. An important safeguard for the preservation of a democratic spirit in the American army is the fact that the officers are drawn from no special class of our citizenship, but from the whole body of the people, regardless of wealth, birth and social position.

But the army with which we were connected, that of the civil war: the greatest ever brought into existence by our country, and its campaigns and battles were on a scale of surpassing magnitude. There were more than a score of single battles, sometimes extending over several days, in each of which the losses in killed wounded on the federal side were greater than the aggregate of all our losses in all our wars combined. How paltry seemed the 5,000 killed and wounded in the war 1812, or the war in Mexico, or the war with Spain, compared with the 14,000 at Shiloh, 15.000 at the Chickahominy: 13.000 at the same at Fredericks-Antietam: burg; 16,000 at Chancellorsville; 23,-000 at Gettysburg: 16,000 at Chickamauga; 37,000 in the Wilderness and 26,000 at Spottsvlvania. The grand aggregate of destruction fairly staggers the imagination, accustomed as we have been for more than a generation to the figures: 93,000 killed by bullets, 186,000 killed by disease, 25,000 dead from other dauses--a grand total of 304,000, about one in nine who wore the uniform.

of the Indicating the magnitude struggle in another way, is the long list of battles, combats and engageskirmishes. ments, excluding mere which in another war would have been noted, the total number of engagements was 2.261; and of these nearly 2,000 were in the 1.092 days of 1862-55-64; an average of almost two a day, week in and week out for three long! Before their term of enlistyears. ment expired men in the ranks began to dream of home and family and friends as of something remote in the past, like ancient history, and as live sight.

unlikely to form part of their surroundings in the future, as the arrival of the millenium. They came to think that they themselves had never led any other life than the present one of tramping through the mud, sleeping on the wet ground, with a flimsy piece of shelter tent over their heads, walking up down a sentry's post during the long watches of the nights, firing hostile bullets at their fenowmen and receiving wounds from them. They almost forgot that there was any other kind of food but fat pork, stringy beef and hard tack; any other drink but strong coffee, any other kind of cup but one of tin. The end of the war seemed as far away as the end of a long life to a young man, or father, and in their nightmare they saw themselves condemned through endless years to continue in the treadmill of their monotonous suffering. until finally their time should come to drop dead, as they had seen so many of their comrades or to pass out of the army by way of the hospital, leaving an arm or a leg there. There have been longer wars, but never one with such length sustained with such unflagging and intense energy, by such a multihude of men.

In no other war in all time has such respect been paid to the dead. mediately after its close the secretary of war was directed by congress to secure suitable burial places and to have these grounds enclosed, so that the resting places of the honored dead may be kept sacred forever." In seven:y-nine separate and distinct national cemeteries the bodies nearly 300,000 soldiers who died during the civil war are interred, and the decorations of their graves with flowers on a fixed day has become a national custom. Some of the cemeteries contain each a silent army of over 10,000 soldiers. in serried marked by the white headstones, or nearly half of which is inscribed "Unknown." The world may be searched in vain for anything similar or kindred: there is no other such impressOn fame's eternal camping ground Their silent tents are spread; And glory guards, with solemn round, The bivouac of the dead.

Such is the inscription at the gate of every one of the national cemeteries.

Professor Hall spoke as follows:

Mr. Toastmaster: I am reminded tonight that it was just forty years ago, when you men in blue were fighting for the preservation of the union at the front, that congress paused for a short time in the midst of the responsibilities of that struggle to enact a law that has done as much as any national law of recent times to promote college and university education in the United States. This was the Morrill act of 1862 which worked greatly for the cause of popular education in the west. the foundation for our agricultural colleges and western universities. Founded by loyal men in times that tried men's souls these institutions have redeemed their cost in the blood of their sons.

Some of us, a little too young to have seen the civil war, yet near enough those times to know something of its cost, and old enough to look thoughtfully upon the character of our college boys, have wondered in years past as we saw our classrooms full of youths with sleeklyparted hair and carefully creased tennis clothes, if these boys would spring to the call of arms if ever it sounded, as did their fathers in '61. Cuban soil, where our O'Neill fought and our Brodie felt the Spanish bullet proves our college boys to be filled with the same blood that flowed in their father's veins.

The college boy here in the west tas proved true to the trust of his college sire in the east. There, at Harvard, the proudest building upon the campus is the Memorial hall, erected to the memory of the sons of Harvard who fell in the great struggle. There is also a parochial school conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph with a capacity of about 800 and an academy for young ladies conducted by the same sisters.

Also an Indian industrial school with an attendance of about 200 of both sexes. Then we have the "Pride of Arizona," the territorial university, with an attendance of about 200, young ladies and gentlemen.







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PROCEEDINGS

of the

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

In compliance with resolutions of the Fifteenth Annual Encampment and General Orders No. 2, the Sixteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, G. A. R., convened at the hall of J. W. Owen Post No. 5 in Phoenix on April 15, 1903, at 11 a.m., and was called to order by the Department Commander.

Comrade D. P. Kyle, of J. W. Owen Post, reported as Officer of the Day, and Comrade John F. Hill, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard.

On the calling of the roll of officers it was found that the Junior Vice Commander and the Chaplain were absent. The Commander appointed Comrade Edward Schwartz Junior Vice Commander pro tem., and Comrade A. L. Grow Chaplain pro tem. The Encampment was then opened in due form.

The Committee on Credentials reported that it had examined the credentials presented, and found that 75 Comrades are legal members of the Encampment.

The report was, on motion, received, adopted and the committee discharged.

The following members were found to be present:

C. F. Schumacher, Department Commander and Senior Vice Commander of Negley Post No. 1; I. M. Christy, Senior Vice Department Commander and Past Commander of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; W. F. R. Schindler, Assistant Adjutant General, Assistant Quartermaster General, Past Department and Past Post Commander; A. L. Grow, Past Department and Past Post Commander, Chaplain pro tem.; Edward Schwartz, Past Department and Past Post Commander, Junior Vice Commander pro tem.; R. H. Greene, Member of Council and Past Post Commander; Jas. H. Creighton, Judge Advocate and Commander of J. W. Owen Post; Chas. D. Belden, Past Department and Post Commander; P. P. Parker, Past Department and Post Commander; A. J. Doran, Past Commander of Barrett Post No. 3; George W. Sanders, Past Post Commander; Jas. D. Monihon, Past Post Commander; Jno. L. Burrows, Past Post Commander; T. W. Hanks and D. P. Kyle, Delegates, and J. F. Hill, Alternate of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; R. K. Farnsworth, Commander of Sedgwick Post No. 10. Total, 17.

The Commander delivered the following address:

Comrades of the Sixteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona:

At the Fifteenth Encampment I was honored by being elected your Department Commander. My short administration of ten months has been uneventful, and there is but little to report.

The appeal of the Commander of Alexander Post at Globe, against the decision of my predecessor, in the matter of the reinstatement of dropped members, was by the last encampment referred to me for settlement. I appointed Comrade Minty, Commander of Negley Post, a committee of one to investigate, and if possible make an amicable settlement of the matter. Comrade

Minty was unable to go to Globe, and asked for and received authority to delegate that duty to Comrade Belden of Owen Post, who was about to visit Globe on other business. I have not yet received a report from Comrade Belden.

Samuel J. Crawford of Washington, D. C., Ex-Governor of Kansas and a Comrade, has addressed a circular letter to Department Commanders suggesting important changes in the Pension Laws. These changes as stated by him are, "Giving to every soldier and sailor under sixty-five years of age who served in the war of the rebellion for ninety days or longer, a pension of twelve dollars and fifty cents per month; to those over sixty-five and under seventy, fifteen dollars a month; and all over seventy, twenty dollars a month." And asking for action of Posts and Departments in favor of his scheme, and to raise the necessary means to cover the expenses of advocating it.

It appears to me that there is not the most remote possibility of getting such a law enacted; and if there was such a possibility, the mode of proceeding adopted by Mr. Crawford is irregular and faulty.

If the assistance of Posts and Departments is required or desired, the request or suggestion for that assistance should come from National Headquarters. I refer the matter to the Eucamp ment and submit Mr. Crawford's letter herewith.

I invite the attention of the Encampment to the report of the Assistant Adjutant-General and the Assistant Quartermaster-General.

In closing, I desire to thank Comrade Schindler, the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General for the manner in which he has conducted the duties devolving on him, and I commend him to the Comrades as an earnest, faithful and enthusiastic Comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic.

On motion of Comrade Belden, the Senior Vice Commander appointed the following committee on the address of the Department Commander: Comrades Belden, Farnsworth and Grow.

The Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General then read the following report, which was also referred to the above committee.

C. F. Schumacher, Department Commander:

Leaving the Department at the end of the year with 8 Posts and 196 members in good standing. The gains and losses during the last three months are not known at this office, as no reports for that period are on hand.

As seen by the mortuary report, eight deaths occurred between June of last year and today, as far as reported. Among those who have finished their earthly career are Department Medical Director Geo. D. Kendall and Department Inspector Gilbert D. Gray.

The remarks in my report of last year as to the apathy displayed by the smaller Posts, still holds good. The Commander in Chief, in directing attention to the necessity of taking up vigorously and systematically the work of recruiting, points to the remedy when he says: "Make Post meetings attractive and

urge comrades to attend. Let every comrade take an interest in the work of the Post, and endeavor to increase the membership."

J. W. Owen Post a short time ago held an open meeting, to which all old soldiers were invited. A few comrades spoke about the necessity of standing together. The result was that additions were made to the roll of the Post. Let other Posts do the same, and similar beneficial results will follow.

It was found during the year that Old Glory did not fly over some of the school houses in the Territory during school hours, and on investigation it was discovered that our Statute books contained no law governing the premises. A bill was therefore introduced at the session of the last Legislature, providing for the purchase and the display of United States flags in connection with the public school buildings within the Territory, which bill, I am glad to state, was passed unanimously, received the approval of the Governor, and is now a law. By its provisions the flying of the flag over or near our school houses during school hours and on holidays is made compulsory.

The Department banner has been repaired, as ordered. All orders received have been promptly distributed from this office, and all letters and enquiries, which have come to hand, have been answered at once.

The exhibit of receipts and expenditures shows a balance of \$252.30 on hand, which sum is as has been customary, deposited in the Valley Bank of Phoenix.

An inventory of supplies on hand shows value of those supplies to be \$37.52.

There are no outstanding debts against the Department.

Commander—I desire to express my high appreciation of your confidence and esteem. You have been my Commander, and with the greatest interest in your administration, I have endeavored to so conduct the office of Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General as to give satisfaction to yourself and the comrades of the Department. To others of the Department officers, I offer sincere thanks for their continued courtesy. And to the comrades of the Department, who make up our numerical strength as an organization, I can only express my sincere fraternal sentiment and heartfelt thanks for their uniform generous treatment.

The Assistant Adjutant General stated that no other reports of officers had been received.

The Commander, on motion, appointed the following Committee on Resolutions: Comrades Parker, Schwartz and Christy.

Past Department Commander Belden, to whom the Department Commander had referred the heretofore reported controversy in Col. Alexander Post No. 6 for investigation, filed a report and protest from nine Comrades of that Post, which were, on motion, accepted and ordered to be printed in the published proceedings of this Encampment. The committee was discharged with the thanks of the Encampment.

On motion of Comrade Belden, the hour of 2:30 p. m. was designated for the election of officers for the ensuing term.

The Council of Administration reported that the accounts and vouchers of the Assistant Quartermaster General had been carefully examined, found correct and approved.

A request from several Comrades for the endorsement of the candidacy of Department Chaplain Winfield Scott for Chaplain-in-Chief at the next National Encampment, was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Letter of regret from Comrade Minty, to be unable to attend the Encampment on account of press of urgent business engagements, was read and duly acknowledged.

A letter from the "National Tribune," Washington, as to pension legislation, was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Comrade Monihon announced that the Woman's Relief Corps invited the Comrades and friends to a Campfire on Thursday, April 16th, at 2 p. m. Accepted with thanks.

On motion, adjournment was ordered to 2 p. m.

The Encampment met pursuant to adjournment and was, by the Department Commander, declared open. The Committee on Commander's Address and Officers' Reports asked for further time until 10 a.m. on April 16th. Granted.

On motion of Comrade Doran, seconded by Comrade Schwartz, Prescott was unanimously selected as the place, and the third Wednesday in May, 1904, as the time of holding the Seventeenth Annual Encampment of this Department.

The present ratio of the Department per capita tax was continued for the next year.

The hour for the election of officers having arrived, the Commander called for the nomination of candidates for Department Commanders.

Comrade Schwartz, in a short speech, presented the name of Comrade Geo. W. Sanders, of J. W. Owen Post, for Commander. Comrade Doran seconded the nomination. Comrade Christy moved that the nominations be closed, and that the Assistant Adjutant General cast the vote of the Encampment for Comrade Geo. W. Sanders for Department Commander. The motion prevailed and the vote was so cast.

Comrade Sanders, signifying his willingness to accept, was duly declared elected Department Commander for the ensuing term.

For Senior Vice Department Commander, Comrade Belden nominated Comrade I. M. Christy, of J. W. Owen Post. Nomination seconded by Comrades Schindler and Burrows. Comrade Christy attempted to decline. Declination not accepted, and the Comrade was unanimously elected Senior Vice Department Commander for the ensuing term, and so declared.

Comrade R. K. Farnsworth, of Sedgwick Post No. 10, was, by Comrade Burrows, nominated for Junior Vice Department Commander. Nomination seconded and the Comrade was unanimously elected, and so declared.

For the remaining offices to be filled, the following Comrades were successively nominated, in each case unanimously elected, and so declared:

Medical Director, Chas. D. Belden, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; Department Chaplain, Winfield Scott, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; Council of Administration, R. H. G. Minty, of Negley Post No. 1; A. J. Doran, of Barrett Post No. 3; W. H. Pierce, of Ransom Post No. 4; W. H. Dunham, of Alexander Post No. 6; D. F. Phelan, of Sedgwick Post No. 10; Delegate to the Thirty-seventh National Encampment, Jno. L. Burrows, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5; Alternate, R. H. Greene, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5.

On motion, the installation of officers was ordered to take place on Thursday, April 16th, at 10:30 a.m.

The Commander asked to be excused from further attendance, pressing business demanding his immediate departure for Tucson. Leave of absence unanimously granted.

Past Department Commander Grow was similarly excused.

Adjournment until 10 a.m. on April 16th.

SESSION OF APRIL 16.

The Encampment convened at 10 a.m., Senior Vice Department Commander I.M. Christy presiding.

The Committee on the Address of the Department Commander and Officers' Reports submitted the following report, which was, on motion, received, unanimously adopted and the committee discharged.

To the Sixteenth Annual Encampment:

Your Committee to whom was referred the address of the Department Commander and the reports of the several Department Officers, having carefully read and duly considered the same, would respectfully report. We commend our Department Commander's zeal and devotion as displayed in the several matters in his report, and recommend a vote of thanks to Department Commander Schumacher for his attention to the affairs of the Department during his term of office.

We agree with the expressions made use of in connection with the communication from Ex-Governor Crawford. We do not favor any move on the part of the several Department Encampments to raise funds for the expressed purpose of advocating measures intended to modify the Pension Laws. We heartily endorse and believe in the support of any measure that will more liberally relieve the wants of the "old soldier" in his declining years. We have heretofore expressed our belief that notwithstanding the great outlay through the pensions annually paid to our deserving Comrades, his distress is not adequately relieved, and we trust the wisdom of Congress will create and enact a better and more adequate method of supporting those needy Comrades, whose inability was created by service in maintaining our Government.

Assistant Adjutant-General Schindler has again submitted an admirable report and we feel that our Department owes an expression of kindly esteem for his service. We therefore recommend a vote of thanks be specially voted Comrade Schindler for his faithfulness and constancy in Grand Army work, in discharging the onerous duties of both Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General of our organization in this Territory.

We are pleased to observe the careful protection of our funds and property, and that our affairs have been so economically managed.

We rejoice in the passage of the Law by the last Legislature of our Territory, requiring the flying of the United States Flag over our schoolhouses, and we extend our congratulations to all who joined in our efforts to thus create and maintain a spirit of reverence for all that "Old Glory" implies. In the word of presenting and urging this law, Comrade Schindler was first and foremost; but to the honor of all concerned, we cheerfully record

the fact that from first to last there was not the least intimation of opposition. All seemed delighted to cheer the bill on its course. The spirit with which it was generally received was envied by our Governor, Colonel Alex. O. Brodie, himself an old soldier, who had fought under its folds, who said, "That bill cannot come down for my signature any too quickly." We must also record a good word for our dear sisters of the Relief Corps for their assistance and aid in materially swelling the applauding sentiments with which that law was so unanimously hailed.

The Committee on Resolutions then submitted the following report, which was, on motion, received, unanimously adopted and the committee discharged:

To the Sixteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, G. A. R.

Your Committee on Resolutions beg leave to present the following resolutions:

Ist. Resolved, That the Sixteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, Grand Army of the Republic, most heartily endorses the candidacy of Comrade Winfield Scott for the office of Chaplain-in-Chief at the Thirty-seventh National Encampment of the G. A. R., and our delegates to said Encampment, to be held in San Francisco, Cal., in August next, are hereby instructed to use their best endeavors to secure his election to that office.

Comrade Winfield Scott entered the army at an early age as a volunteer with a company composed largely of students from the Theological Seminary at Rochester, N. Y. He served with distinction as Captain of his company and eventually became Colonel of his regiment, acting in several engagements as Brigade and Division Commander.

Shortly after the close of the war he was appointed Chaplain in the regular army and served as such until regularly retired. He has served as Post and Department Chaplain for years, doing faithful work among the veterans. His usual salutation to the Comrades has been "We are blood relations," and this expression, which we recognize as one peculiarly fitting to his temperament, has endeared him to the Comrades as their spiritual

advisor. We trust that his numerous friends in other Departments will unite with us in our effort to honor him, by electing him to the office of Chaplain-in-Chief.

We cannot speak in too much praise of their able work.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ALEXANDER POST, No. 6, Globe.

DEAR SIR AND COMRADE—We, the members of Colonel J. W. S. Alexander Post No. 6, G. A. R., ex-members of the G. A. R. and soldiers of the civil war, are surprised at the action of the Committee on Reports and Resolutions in the matter of Comrade Schulze's appeals from the decisions of the Department Commander and of Past Post Commander Dunham, by publishing to the world that there is trouble in our Post. There is no trouble but what Comrade Schulze makes himself by objecting to everything the Post does, and voting contrary to the balance of the members. The decisions of Past Post Commander Dunham were approved by all the members present except Comrade Schulze, he (Schulze) continuing his tirade till spoken to by Rev. McIntyre, a member of the G. A. R., telling him that action of the Post was correct.

Schulze still continued his talk till the Post Commander told him to be still or he would prefer charges against him, or words to that effect; all this tirade while ladies and gentlemen were in the next room waiting for admission to attend our installation. The members of this Post cannot understand how it is that the Department officers can recognize complaints not being forwarded through the proper channel and having no proofs of allegations submitted therewith. All this fuss of Comrade Schulze is a private matter.



PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

Seventeenth Annual Encampment

OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF ARIZONA

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

In compliance with resolutions of the Sixteenth Annual Encampment and General Orders No. 4, Current Series, the Seventeenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Arizona, G. A. R., convened at the hall of Barrett Post No. 3, in Prescott, on May 18, 1904, at 2 p. m., and was called to order by the Department Commander.

Comrade Wm. H. Ferguson, of Barrett Post, reported as Officer of the Day, and Comrade Timothy Fell, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard.

Roll-call of officers was had. The Senior Vice-Commander being absent, and the office of the Junior Vice-Commander being vacant, the Commander appointed Comrade Samuel Goldsworthy, of Barrett Post, Senior Vice-Commander pro tem, and the Encampment elected Comrade J. N. McCandless, of Barrett Post, Junior Vice-Commander for the unexpired term.

The Encampment was then opened in due form.

The Committee on Credentials reported that after due examination 80 Comrades are found to be legal members of this Encampment.

The report was, on motion, received, adopted and the Committee discharged.

The elected members of the Council of Administration being absent, Comrades Parker and Judd were duly elected members pro tem of the Council.

The Department Commander delivered the following address:

COMRADES:—As set forth in General Order No. 3, on the 6th day of February, 1904, our beloved Comrade and Commander Geo. W. Sanders departed this life. In his death our Department suffered a grievous loss. Having been quite intimately acquainted with him, I wish to bear witness to his kind and loving disposition and his love and loyalty to the old soldiers and especially to the Grand Army of the Republic.

In accordance with the rules, on his death, I assumed command of the Department. My command has been short—about three and one-half months—during which time nothing of special importance concerning our Department has occurred.

Owing to sickness and my official duties, I have been unable to visit any of the Posts of the Department, and cannot therefore make an extended report as to their condition.

Comrades—we are growing old—each year sees our ranks being more rapidly depleted and joining the host on the other shore. But a few years more and we shall all have listened to the last "Tattoo" and passed over. By reference to the Adjutant General's report, you will observe that we have lost 28 members from our rolls during the past year over and above the gains from enlistment, etc. J. W. Owens' Post being the only Post showing an increased membership, although suffering the heaviest loss from death's cold hand. Is it not possible for the other Posts to imitate her example and by special effort show an increased membership at the end of next year? There are numbers of old soldiers throughout the Territory who have never joined the organization, others coming from the East have allowed their membership to lapse and never joined here, and others have been

dropped for non-payment of dues. Let us all make a special effort, the coming year, and hunt up all the old soldiers we can find and try to pursuade them to join some Post. Every old soldier should belong to the Grand Army and a little urging is all many a man needs, who will not think of it or join unless so reminded or urged.

Hunt up the delinquents and get them reinstated and I believe success will crown our efforts.

In the death of Past Department Commander Edward Schwartz, our Department has sustained a serious loss. A gallant soldier during the war, his warmest sympathy and assistance was ever extended to his old comrades, and he was ever ready to respond to any demand or request from the Grand Army.

To the Ladies of the "Woman's Relief Corps," God bless them, I desire to extend my thanks for their ready and efficient aid to the Posts of the Grand Army, in caring for the old soldiers and their families in their hours of suffering and bereavement.

I most heartily extend my thanks to Past Department Commander Schindler, our efficient Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, for his efficient assistance and counsel during my short time in office.

And now, my comrades, I lay down the gavel, the symbol of authority, trusting that we shall all use our utmost endeavors, during the coming year, to build up the Posts of our Department, and that of those of us who may be permitted to meet at our next annual Encampment it may be said, "Well done, good and faithful members."

The Council of Administration reported that it had examined the account of the Assistant Quarter-master-General, accompanied by proper vouchers, and had found all receipts properly accounted for and all disbursements legally made. The account is approved by the Council.

Resulting in a loss of 28 members. Post No. 7, at Tempe, has for some time failed to furnish reports, although repeatedly and urgently requested to do so, and had to be placed on the delinquent list. From personal investigation, I have become satisfied that there is no likelihood of a revival of the Post, the members having become widely scattered; and I have advised those who remain in the neighborhood of Tempe, to transfer to the Post at Phoenix, which they have promised to do.

Our death roll is growing larger every year, reminding us that we are all nearing our end. Among those who have answered their last roll call, are Department Commander Geo. W. Sanders, who died while in office, and Past Department Commander Edward Schwartz, both earnest and energetic Comrades.

Our Department banner, which was repaired in 1902, was badly torn in the parade at the National Encampment in San Francisco last August, and ought not to be carried in future parades. It is very heavy and unhandy to handle; a regulation banner would be much lighter, and easily carried.

The balance of \$207.87 in the treasury is deposited in the Valley Bank of Phoenix, as has been the custom for years.

The supplies on hand are valued at \$39.50.

There are no outstanding claims against the Department.

All orders and communications have been promptly distributed.

All Department officers, both elective and appointive, have worked earnestly for the best interests of the Department, and I have been treated with the utmost courtesy by them, for which I tender my sincere thanks.

I embrace this opportunity to extend to you, Commander, my most sincere and heartfelt thanks for my appointment as Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General, and trust that I have fulfilled my trust with reasonable success.

Comrade Schindler moved the endorsement of the resolution of the 37th National Encampment in favor of the so-called Grand Army Service Pension Bill now before Congress. Motion seconded and unanimously adopted.

At 2.40 p. m. a recess was taken for half an hour.

Encampment re-assembled at 3.20 p.m., all the officers in their respective places.

The Committee on Reports and Resolutions submitted the following report, which was, on motion, received, unanimously adopted, and the committee discharged:

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Address of the Department Commander and the Reports of the various Department Officers, beg leave to state that we have carefully read the address of the Department Commander and are pleased to say that no complaints have been made to this department requiring action at this Encampment. We read the Roll of Honor with sorrow and sympathy for the Posts who have seen their ranks thinning one by one, reminding us that the finger of time is pointing our way, and that the work left for us to do must be done soon or left unfinished at the final reveille.

We most heartily endorse the suggestions of the Commander, that each Post use more strenuous efforts to gather in those who have become delinquent, and all old soldiers who have never been mustered into some Post, and help to fill our ranks as full as the scythe of time will permit. We recommend that a memorial page be set apart in our Annual Proceedings in honor of our departed comrades. That a letter of fraternal sympathy be sent to the widows of our deceased Past Department Commanders, G. W. Sanders, Edward Schwartz, and Past Department Senior Vice-Commanders, John Y. T. Smith and John L. Burrows, by the Adjutant General and under the seal of this Department.

We are so accustomed to full and accurate reports from our efficient Adjutant-General and Quartermaster-General that we looked for just what we got—full and correct accounts of all funds belonging to the Department.

Your Committee desire to extend the soldierly greeting to the Woman's Relief Corps for the unselfish devotion and loyal labor they are ever giving to the Posts of our Department and to the old soldiers wherever they may be. We are glad to add our vote of thanks to the Pension Department and to the President of the United States for the remembrance of the old soldiers.

The Committee also reported the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Your Committee regret exceedingly to find so few Posts represented at this Encampment, and in order that the meetings of this Department Encampment may be more fully attended, therefore be it

Resolved, That at all future Encampments of this Department each Post see to it that one member of their Post attend such Encampment.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment be tendered to the several Railroad Companies for their kind and generous treatment in according courtesies to the members of this Encampment.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Encampment be extended to our Comrades of Barrett Post for their cordial welcome and their continued and pleasant attention to the Comrades during their stay in Prescott.

At 5 p. m. the officers-elect were duly installed by Past Department Commander W. F. R. Schindler.

Commander Christy announced as his Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, W. F. R. Schindler, of J. W. Owen Post No. 5, who was duly installed by Past Department Commander P. P. Parker.

Commander Christy made a few appropriate remarks and closed the Encampment.


RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT AND SYMPATHY



PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

Eighteenth Annual Encampment

OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF ARIZONA

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

Encampment called to order at Masonic Hall, Phoenix, at 11 a. m. on April 19th, 1905, by the Department Commander. Resolutions of the last Encampment, fixing place and date, and General Orders No. 2, c. s., convening the Encampment, read.

Comrade P. P. Parker, of J. W. Owen Post, reported as Officer of the Day, and Comrade A. J. Weaver, of the same Post, as Officer of the Guard.

Roll-call of officers The Senior Vice-Commander being absent, and the office of Junior Vice Commander being vacant, the Commander appointed Comrade R. H. Greene, of Owen Post, as Senior Vice-Commander pro tem, and Comrade Josiah M. Fike, of the same Post, as Junior Vice-Commander pro tem.

The Encampment was then opened in due form.

The Committee on Credentials reported 78 Comrades as entitled to membership of the Encampment. Report adopted and Committee discharged.

The Department Commander then delivered the following address:

COMRADES:—The sad event of the death of Commander I. M. Christy, on March, 31st, having been the cause of my succeeding to the command of the Department for a few weeks, I will have to refer to the report of the Assistant Adjutant General as to the condition of the Department and its administration during the past year.

Too much cannot be said of the goodness of heart and sterling integrity of Commander Christy. He was beloved by all, and loved, above all, his old comrades in arms and the Grand Army of the Republic. His earthly troubles are ended. May he rest in peace.

The grim reaper of Death is depleting our ranks more rapidly each year, but the main cause of our diminishing numbers is the neglect of the Comrades to attend Post meetings and to keep in touch with our organization. Those who are well able to pay their dues omit to do so, and the Posts, being handicapped financially, are unwilling to pay the Department per capita tax for such members. Suspension follows, and the membership is reduced correspondingly. Let each Post select a suitable committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the delinquent members and induce them to place themselves in good standing; also to hunt up Comrades who have come here to reside, and have allowed their membership to lapse in other Posts.

I can see no reason why, with renewed efforts, our next Encampment should not show an increased membership of every Post.

Resulting in a net loss of 25 members. 12 comrades died in 1904, and 19 were suspended. Since the first of January of this year, J. W. There are no claims against the Department.

I sincerely thank you, Commander, and all Department officers, for the uniform confidence and courtesy shown me.

There being no other offers, Phoenix was, on motion, unanimously selected as the place, and the third Thursday in April, 1906, (April 19th) as the time of holding the 19th Annual Encampment of this Department.

Recess until 2 p. m., when the Encampment reassembled. All the officers in their respective places.

The Committee on Reports submitted the following:

We, your Committee on the Address of the Department Commander and the Reports and Books of the several officers of this Department for the term ending this day, respectfully report: That we heartily endorse the suggestions and recommendations of the Commander as to the steps which should be taken towards bringing all Veterans into the ranks of our Posts.

That we have carefully examined the books of the Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster-General, and find them well kept and correct; and also, that we are of the opinion that a report or examination by a committee is superfluous, while we have so careful and efficient an officer as Comrade W. F. R. Schlindler performing the duties of Assistant Adjutant-General and Assistant Quartermaster General of this Department.

Report, on motion, adopted and Committee discharged.

The following, reported by the Committee on Resolutions, were unanimously adopted, and the Committee discharged.

That each Post is requested to make provision so that at least one delegate of their Post attend Department Encampments.

That the thanks of this Encampment be tendered to the several railroad companies for their kind and generous treatment in according reduced transportation rates.

That the thanks of this Encampment be and are hereby extended to the Comrades of J. W. Owen Post for their cordial welcome and pleasant attention to the members of the Encampment during their stay in Phoenix.

That we extend a soldierly greeting to the Woman's Relief Corps for the unselfish devotion and loyal labor towards the Posts of our Department and to the Veterans and their families. God bless them!

That the thanks of the Encampment are tendered to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for the use of their hall on Wednesday night, and to the members of the Eastern Star for the loan of their dishes, and of the splendid decorations of the hall.

That the attention of the authorities of the public schools of the territory is called to Act 19 of the Twenty-second legislature of Arizona, Section 1, "It shall be the duty of the school authorities of every school district of the Territory of Arizona to purchase a United States flag, flagstaff and the necessary appliances therefor, and to display such flag upon or near such school building during school hours, and at such other times as said school authorities may direct." It having been reported to the Encampment that the trustees of the public schools of Phoenix have neglected to comply with said law and have permitted the Woman's Relief Corps of Phoenix to purchase flags for her schools out of the pittance raised by these patriotic women for charitable purposes, needed to meet the necessities of the old veterans and their families in want; we express the hope that the patriotic citizens of a city that ought to be an example of loyalty to law and a promoter of patriotism among her youth to every town and community in our Territory, will require her school authorities to comply with this act.

RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT

Whereas, The Supreme Commander has caused to be mustered out of earthly service since our last Department Encampment three of our Department officers, I. M. Christy, Department Commander; J. N. McCandless, Medical Director; and John H. Bauman, Department Inspector. Therefore be it resolved

- 1. That by the death of these Comrades, the Department of Arizona has lost three of her most worthy members, as evidenced by the responsible positions they had been called to fill in our organization, and as our ranks are being continually depleted, we greatly deplore their loss and miss their comradeship.
- 2. We console ourselves to know that when the last tatto was sounded, these Comrades could look back over their soldier life and realize that all its dangers and perils contributed to the present unity of our nation and its greatness and influence among the peoples of the world, and realize that these hardships had not been endured in vain.
- 3. That in the death of Department Commander I. M. Christy this Department lost a gentlemanly comrade and efficient officer, who by his cheerful and unassuming disposition in active service in the army, in his home life and the community and in his official life, in the various civil offices which he filled, has left a worthy inheritance to his family and friends.
- 4. That this Department extends to the families of these our Comrades, our heartfelt consolation and hope that they may feel an additional consolation in remembering that a grateful nation

remembers them among its defenders, and that their children and children's children in ages to come, can point with pride to the deeds of their ancestors.

5. That these resolutions be given a page in the proceedings of this Encampment, and copies of the same mailed to the families of these Comrades.

The present ratio of representation and Department per capita tax was continued for the next year.

The usual number of copies of the proceedings of the Encampment, together with orders issued during the past year, and a roster of the Department and Posts were, on motion, ordered to be printed.

Past Department Commander A. L. Grow duly installed the officers-elect, also Assistant Adjutant General and Assistant Quartermaster General W. F. R. Schindler, who had been re-appointed by the Department Commander.

There being no further business before the Encampment, it was closed in due form.

At 8 p. m. a camp fire was held under the auspices of J. W. Owen Corps, W. R. C., who furnished an elegant spread. A feature of the camp fire was the trial of Comrade M. J. Galpin, on the charge of having illegally appropriated a hog during the Civil War. The accused was sentenced to help the ladies of the W. R. C. in waiting at the tables. The trial created universal enjoyment and laughter.

Let each comrade observe the day by displaying the flag on his house and place of business, and request his neighbors to do the same, as well as to urge the school authorities in their respective districts to arrange for special and appropriate exercises by the schools.
- 9. In Paragraph 3 of National General Orders No. 9, dated May 16, 1904, comrades are requested to complete their individual records, hearing particularly upon the rights of possible widows. Said paragraph will be read at each of the next two Post meet-

ings, and the statements filed in conformity therewith will be placed on record in the archives of the Posts, where they are easily accessible.
