Opening:

Commander Booth opened the meeting of the Picacho Peak Camp No. 1, SUVCW at 11:30am and Chaplain James Heller provided the Invocation followed by all reciting the American's Creed and Pledge of Allegiance.

Commander Booth declared the meeting officially open and welcomed all the members and guests.

Officer Reports:

Secretary / Treasurer Martorano (ST):

In accordance with Article 7 (VII), Section 3 of the Picacho Peak Camp bylaws, six Brothers shall be necessary to constitute a quorum at a regular or special meeting of this Camp. A total of 10 Brothers were present, meeting the quorum requirement of 6. ST Martorano offered a motion to waive the reading of the Minutes from our August meeting, as they will be published in the Department Newsletter.

Commander Booth asked for a second, which was received. Upon placing the motion before the membership, it passed unanimously. *Membership:*

Treasurer's Report:

ST Martorano announced the current balance of our checking account and stated the current balance checking, general, and memorial funds. The money in the memorial fund will be transferred to the DSW after the March Encampment. The general fund will be used to pay our per capita dues in May.

The 2026 dues collection has been completed. We anticipate 6 members will drop with the March 31st cutoff.

Guide / JROTC Coordinator Huskisson:

Brother Huskisson provided an update on the ROTC awards program and reported that awards for 2026 are in progress. He will continue to keep the Department updated as the process moves forward.

Old Business: none

New Business:

Commander Booth discussed the upcoming Department Encampment. Brother Martorano reviewed the requirements for delegates, identified which members were automatic delegates, and asked if any additional members wished to be elected as delegates. No additional members were elected. Brother Martorano then made a motion that all Camp members in good standing be elected as alternate delegates. The motion received a second and passed unanimously. Brother Martorano discussed several financial hurdles within the Camp, including the excessive expenses associated with new membership. This issue had previously been submitted to the Camp Council for review. After discussion, Brother Martorano made a motion to eliminate the purchase of a Membership Badge, name tag, and rosette by the Camp. Instead, the Camp will only purchase the certificate and will assist new members in obtaining the additional items at their own expense. The motion received a second and passed with 7 members in favor and 2 opposed.

Awards & Certificates: None this period.

New Member Inductions: New Brother Charles Randall Miller (Randy) was inducted into the Camp. Welcome Brother Randy!

Closing of the Camp Meeting: Commander Booth announced the closing of the meeting, and Chaplain Heller provided the closing prayer.

Last Union Veteran of Mohave County:

-The U. S Grant Camp #3 held a Last Union Veteran Ceremony and Headstone Dedication in Kingman on May 9, 2026. These important rituals were done in collaboration with Company G, 1st CA Inf. The Last Veteran Ceremony honored Pvt. Henry Leffler, Co. K, 39th WI Inf. who died on July 15, 1931 and the Headstone Dedication was at the grave of Corp. Francis Farley, Co E 19th IA Inf. who died on November 9, 1916. Corp. Farley's grave had been with a marker since 1917. Present were Department Commander and 1st Sgt, Co. G, 1st CA Inf. W. Mark Clark and his Wife Stacy, Grant Camp Commander/DSW SVC and Corp. Co. G, 1st CA Inf. Rick Stephens, DSW Patriotic Instruction and Co.G 1st CA Inf. Private Smith was Commander Stephens' GG Grandfather whose headstone was broken last year. He took it upon myself to get the headstone replaced and on April 18, 2026, the headstone replacement ceremony occurred at Red Oak Cemetery, Cambridge, IL.

With Brother Rick in the picture are Brothers from the Department of Illinois. IL Department Commander Michael Zafran (opposite me with the 2-star general outfit) was of tremendous help in organizing his "troops" for this ceremony. The Kewanee Veterans Council provided a 21-gun salute and TAPS.

NEWS FROM Company G, Sons of Veterans Reserve, text by W. Mark Clark, First Sergeant

The Department of the Southwest is one of the newest Departments in the SUVCW. Since its founding in 2015, establishing an SVR unit has been a goal. This past Fall, a serious effort was begun when Dr. Wayne Eder, PCC, the 6 th Military District Commander asked Department SVC W. Mark Clark, PCC to begin recruiting brothers for a unit. Commander Eder had secured seed funding which greatly assisted in this effort.

As a long-time Civil War living historian, I was pleased to undertake the challenge. Over the Fall, through emails, Zoom and phone calls and attendance at Camp meetings, and with the support of Department and Camp officers, the effort proved fruitful. Commander Eder's goal of 11 enlisted men was exceeded and Company G, First California Infantry Volunteers, SVR was stood up on January 1, 2026.

I will serve as its initial First Sergeant. The Company's two Corporals will be Department Commander Todd Hoffay and Department JVC Richard Stephens, CC.

Considering the choice of Company G, 1 st CA Inf. as the unit to memorialize was an easy decision. The California Column had passed through Tucson as it pushed Sherod Hunter's Confederates out of the area. It then established the Post at Tucson. While Company G was not in the lead, one of its Sergeants, George O. Hand, left his diary, which has been published as *The Civil War in Apacheland* (Neil B. Carmony, ed. High-Lonesome Books, Silver City, 1996).

Following the mustering out of the Company at Ft. Craig, NMT on August 31, 1864, Sgt. Hand returned to Tucson where he lived out his life as a bartender and saloon owner and the janitor of the Pima County Courthouse. He also left a highly regarded map of the town. He died in Tucson in 1887 and is buried in the GAR plot of Tucson's Evergreen Cemetery where the brothers of the Gen. RHG Minty Camp #2 decorate his grave (and all the other graves in the plot) every Memorial Day. Having Sgt. Hand's diary allows us special insight into the life of soldiers in the New Mexico Territory. The Company will undertake its first official actions at the upcoming Department Encampment on March 28 th in Tucson, serving as the Color Guard. It will also participate in a Flag raising at old Ft . Lowell, an Indian Wars post from 1873 to 1891.

The flagpole is in front of the adobe remnants of the post hospital, one of the physicians who served there was Walter Reed who played a key role in the control of Yellow Fever. I am excited at the new initiative in the Department of the Southwest. I believe the establishment of Company G will provide the Department with a strong vehicle to pursue with vigor, Commander-in-Chief Kevin Tucker's key goals of Reinforcing Fraternity and Fellowship, Growing and Retaining Membership and Promoting Public Awareness and Outreach.

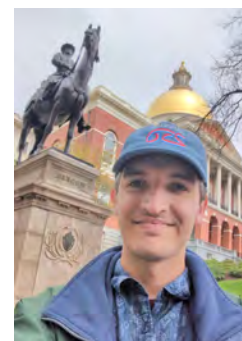

C-in-C Tucker's address to the Dept of the SOUTHWEST ENCAMPMENT March 2026

OPENING

Commander Hoffay, officers, Brothers, family, friends, and honored guests, I thank you for your gracious welcome, and for the bond of fraternity that unites us in this place. It is a profound honor to stand before you here in Tucson—a city whose roots reach deep into the earliest chapters of the American Southwest—and to address this Encampment. We gather not only in fellowship, but in purpose.

A REPUBLIC PRESERVED—A DUTY INHERITED

There are moments in the life of a nation when its future hangs by a thread, when the accumulated hopes of generations stand in peril of being lost. Such a moment came in the spring of 1865. In a quiet Virginia village, amid fields worn by war and men weary beyond words, the great conflict that had torn this nation asunder reached its conclusion. At Appomattox Court House, a war that had tested the very survival of the Republic came to its end. The armies ceased their struggle. The guns fell silent. And the Union endured. But let us understand this clearly: the preservation of the Union was not the end of a story. It was the beginning of a responsibility.

A WAR THAT REACHED EVEN HERE

Yet we do this history a disservice if we confine it to the well-known fields of the East. Because the Civil War was not bounded by rivers or ridgelines—it stretched across a continent. It reached into lands like this: into deserts, where the sun bears down without mercy; into mountain passes, where silence carries weight; into distant outposts, where the flag of the United States stood alone. Here, in the Southwest, the struggle for the Union took on a different form, but it was no less decisive.

THE CONFEDERATE REACH INTO ARIZONA

The Confederacy cast its gaze westward, seeking not only independence, but expansion—toward the Pacific, toward vital routes, toward this vast and strategic land. In 1862, that ambition reached this very place. Confederate forces entered Tucson, raising their standard in this desert settlement, near the Presidio San Agustin del Tucson. For a brief and uncertain moment, the authority of the United States was pushed aside—not in theory, but here, on this ground.

THE CALIFORNIA COLUMN

But the Union answered. From California came a column of soldiers whose march remains one of the great feats of endurance of the war. They crossed deserts, endured heat that

pressed the strength from the body, followed the fragile lifeline of the Butterfield Overland Mail route. At Apache Pass near Fort Bowie, they fought for water, for passage, for the right to continue forward. And forward they went, mile by mile, step by step, until the Union returned to Arizona. Tucson was reclaimed. The Confederate presence disappeared. And the flag of the United States rose again over this desert.

THE FRONTIER SOLDIER

This was not the war of great formations and grand charges. Here, the war was carried in endurance: in lonely posts, in long patrols, in the quiet determination of soldiers who knew that even unseen service could decide the fate of a nation. They held the line—not for recognition, but for the Union. Their service was no less essential. For a nation is preserved not only by great victories, but by faithful service, wherever it is required.

WHAT THEY ENTRUSTED TO US

What did they leave behind? Not merely a reunited country. Not merely a restored flag. They left a trust, a charge, a responsibility—to ensure that what they preserved would not be forgotten and would not be taken for granted.

A NATION WORTHY OF THEIR SACRIFICE

From their sacrifice came transformation. Slavery was abolished. Citizenship defined. The promise of the Declaration of Independence brought closer to reality. But those achievements were not self-sustaining. They required remembrance. They required vigilance. They required citizens willing to carry forward the meaning of the Union.

ARIZONA'S PLACE

And because the Union endured, this land endured within it. From the Presidio to the mail routes to the forts that marked the advance of the nation, Arizona's story unfolded within a preserved Republic. The flag that flies over Tucson today does so because others carried it here and refused to let it fall.

THE 250TH ANNIVERSARY

We now approach a great milestone in the life of our nation. This year, the United States marks two hundred and fifty years since its founding. That anniversary will invite reflection. But reflection alone is not enough. For the question before us is not only what the nation has been, but what we will do with what we have inherited. Our nation's founding declared a promise. The Civil War tested it. And the Union ensured it would endure.

THE CALL

History calls. It calls across time, across distance, across generations. And today, it calls to us. Brothers, memory is not passive. It is not the quiet keeping of names and dates. It is an active duty—to speak, to teach, to remind, to ensure that the meaning of the Union remains alive in every generation.

FINAL CHARGE

The soldiers and sailors of the Union preserved this Republic when its future was uncertain. They chose duty over comfort, sacrifice over safety, country over self. They carried forward the promise of 1776 when it was in jeopardy. And when their work was done, they entrusted that legacy to those who would come after them. The Grand Army of the Republic once bore that responsibility. Now, it rests with us. As Commander-in-Chief, I am mindful: we are not merely heirs to their legacy. We are guardians of it. We are stewards of a sacred trust. We are the voice of Union soldiers and sailors in our own time. And if we do not carry that voice forward, it will fade. But if we do our duty, it will endure. Let us prove worthy of that charge.

PRESENT DUTY

And, Brothers, as we carry forward their memory, as we honor the past, we should not forget those who serve today. Today, American servicemen and women are serving in faraway lands not unlike this one, fighting, sacrificing, placing themselves in harm's way on our behalf. They serve under the same flag—a flag preserved by those we remember here today, for the same enduring principles. Let us remember them, support them, and pray for their safe return home.

CLOSING

In Fraternity. In Charity. In Loyalty. And here, in this desert where the Union once returned and held, let us resolve that we will carry forward the memory, the meaning, and the unfinished work of the soldiers and sailors of the Union, so that what they preserved shall endure—not only in history, but in us. Forward, Brothers!!!—always, forward—in the sacred work of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.
