Minutes of the February 9, 2013 Camp meeting

Camp Commander David A. Swanson called the meeting to order at 12: 00 p.m. We had 25 Brothers and guests in attendance.

Officer reports:

Camp Commander David Swanson discussed the Ambrose Skinner headstone dedication service (see page 3) and the outstanding efforts of our Graves Registration Officer Jan Huber in the entire project. Br. Jan was given a certificate of commendation from our Camp for his efforts.

Junior Vice Commander Jim Heller discussed the upcoming veterans assistance program Arizona StandDown which will take place at the Veterans Memorial Coliseum in Phoenix from March 8-10, 2013 and collected clothing items and money for the program. Br. Jim is our Camp liaison with the organization. Brothers were encouraged to get involved with the program by volunteering time or donating

Br. Jim also talked about the Missing in America Project that our Camp is also involved in. What is the MIAP? Created in 2007 its purpose is to locate, identify, and inter the unclaimed cremated remains of American veterans through the joint efforts of private, state and federal organizations.

Notice was given as to when the ceremony would occur at the Veterans Cemetery in Phoenix. We, along with the SAR, DAR and other fraternal and veterans groups, would then line the driveway as the remains are brought in for the noon service.

Secretary/Treasurer Jerry Bloom advised that we have 84% of our Brothers who have sent in their 2013 dues to date and discussed the upcoming reenactment of the Picacho Pass skirmish and the New Mexico battles of Glorieta and Val Verde on March 16 & 17

Eagle Scout Coordinator Dennis Lamb indicated to Cmdr Swanson earlier that he has processed four certificates to date.

Graves Registration Officer Jan Huber reported that since August 14, 2012 the date of his last report, that he has completed six grave registrations. All were Union soldiers, five were new initial registrations, and one was an update: three were in Greenwood Memory Lawn in Phx; one in Clarkdale, AZ; and two in Ohio cemeteries.

On December 29, 2012 he gave a program on the National Graves Registration project to the Margaret Warner Wood Tent No. 1 DUVCW and they will help him with a survey of a cemetery in Mesa, AZ.

On January 17, 2013 he finished the walking survey of the Greenwood Memory Lawn in Phx and will start next in the Glendale Memorial Park Cemetery.

Total registration activities since his appointment: 251; 164 new initial grave registrations and 87 updates.

David R. Palmateer of Payson, Arizona is our newest Brother. David's ancestor is his great-great-great grandfather Amos Mosher, Co C, 22nd New York Cavalry. Br. Military headstone is added to grave of Buffalo Soldier

The Republic Jacobia laters
Jan Hüber Knows of every Union veteran from
the Civil War buried at Pioneer and Military Memorial Park. He has walked up and down every aisle at
Greenwood Memory Lawn.
At the two Phoenix cometeries, be looks for crumbling headstones to replace with new ones. He looks
for Civil War ern private stones without veteran deignation and orders military stones if his research
reveals the men served.

But he hasn't come across a case like Ambrose
Skinner's.

Skinner was buried without a marker. But about 50 years later, Huber's organization, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, secured a milliary needstone from the U.S. Department of Veterans Af-

Arizona Secretary of State Ken Bennett, pictured above with Skinner's great-granddaughter Diana McClinnon, presented a certificate to her from the State of Arizona. Also pictured in the background is Brother Jan Huber. As stated in the previous newsletter, none of this would have happened except for Brother Huber's persistence.

The story was headline news in the Valley & State section of the Arizona Republic on February 3, 2013 and was broadcast on KPHO Channel 5 television news.

The ceremony was attended by the members of our Camp, Daughters from the Margaret Warner Wood Tent No. 1, members of the Buffalo Soldiers and the general public.

We used the adapted version of the GAR 1917 headstone dedication service which worked out extremely well.

VA Cemeteries Update 07: We've all been taught the consequences of the U.S. Civil War since childhood. How it led to the emancipation of slaves, solidified state and federal rights, and further made the case for women's suffrage. But the unprecedented carnage of the war also transformed the attitude of how the nation honors its military dead; a tradition now indelible to the American spirit. That was the premise behind a talk given by Harvard University President Dr. Drew Faust at VA central office in Washington today. Through her research, Dr. Faust found that the Civil War fundamentally changed the way our country

handled death on the battlefield. Both the Union and Confederacy were ill equipped to bury fallen troops in a dignified manner, and death notifications sent to families were informal and happenstance, if they happened at all. Unmarked and hasty graves littered fields and farms near battlefields where hundreds of thousands of men struggled and died. Humanitarian ideas and the dignity of the human spirit were transformed in the crucible of war, and an emerging sense of responsibility for our war dead led to drastic shift in government obligations.

Edmund Whitman, an Army officer and a quartermaster during the Civil war, led the effort. Whitman inspected cemeteries and battlefields across the south from 1865-1869, examined informal records. and conducted interviews to find out locations of fallen troops. He oversaw the reinterment of over 100,000 Union soldiers. About 300,000 were reburied in 74 national cemeteries, which now fall under the purview of the National Park Service. As Dr. Faust noted, it was Whitman's mission to put human faces and human cost to the war, and to recognize the sacrifices of so many of our own. His work helped to establish the notion that those who fell in battle are to be honored, and it's our duty as citizens to remember and cherish that. It's difficult to fathom the damage of the war. An estimated 600,000 soldiers from both sides were killed: if the war were fought today with the same casualty rate, six million would lay dead. But it's also hard to imagine a time when the care of our slain troops was an afterthought—an annoyance to both troops in the field and folks in the halls of government. It's now one of VA's most sacred obligations, but it took a war of staggering magnitude for our nation to realize it had a duty to honor the dead as much as they honored us. 
